1) INTRODUCTION

Guatemala joined the Open Government Partnership (OGP) on July 27th of 2011 and ratified its membership in 2012. The Guatemalan government has implemented three biannual Open Government Action Plans to date, and is in the process of implementing the Third National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018, which consists of 22 commitments and 92 goals, with 19 responsible entities. The Open Government Technical Roundtable approved this plan on August 11, 2016, created using the specific Open Government methodology under the principles of Transparency, Participation and Collaboration.

The Guatemala Open Government initiative is coordinated by the Guatemalan Open Government Point of Contact, Zaira Mejía, appointed by the Presidency of the Republic, in accordance with the guidelines for adhesion to the Alliance for Open Government AGA-OGP, which establish that the Government of each member country must designate a Point of Contact that will follow up on the compliance with all points of the initiative. With the participation of 70 entities, including public entities, organizations and representatives of the civil society and observers from the Open Government Technical Roundtable, restored as of April 2016, the initiative has become a multisectorial forum with the participation of State agencies, public and autonomous entities, civil society organizations and observers. These entities meet once a month to measure the progress made in fulfillment of OGP commitments, and to propose mechanisms, good practice and innovative Open Government activities for Guatemala.

The Open Government initiative in Guatemala —Alliance for Open Government in Guatemala— constitutes the first axis of the Priority of Open and Effective Public Management, which contributes to transparency and zero tolerance for corruption stated in the policy. Additionally, the Open Government initiative is considered a preventive anti-corruption mechanism, according to the United Nations Convention against Corruption and the Inter-American Convention against Corruption, in addition to complying with the standards contained in the Open Government Declaration that Guatemala is part of.

This is the first time that Guatemala has been able to design a National Open Government Action Plan that complies with all the AGA standards. The methodology, consultation process and Smart method provided by the OGP and proposed by the Point of Contact was enriched with ideas from participating delegates and institutions, and later approved by the Guatemalan Open Government Technical Roundtable.

The National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018 was created to build on the collective determination, and the institutional commitment, for the need for transparency

and accountability throughout the country, to unify all efforts of public entities and civil society organizations that make up the Open Government Technical Roundtable, with support from the highest level government officials and through the work of multi-actor technical working groups.

In this sense, the Open Government Initiative becomes an appropriate mechanism for the prevention of corruption and for the transformation of the public administration, a technical and institutional space for discussion and dialogue with representatives of public institutions, civil society organizations and observers, to build and comply with the 22 commitments that form part of the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018 that consists of 5 essential themes: a) Access to Public Information and Institutional Archives; b) Technological Innovation; 3) Citizen Participation; 4) Accountability; and 5) Fiscal Transparency.

The Open Government initiative has become a priority for the Presidency, and forms part of the Government's Central Policy on "Zero Tolerance to Corruption", as an important technical and institutional mechanism for the prevention of corruption. The government seeks to provide results to citizens and also to co-implement the United Nations Convention against Corruption, and to work towards fulfilling the Sustainable Development Goals.

Fifteen working groups were established during the implementation of this plan. These groups monitor and validate progress and compliance with commitments, together as members of public entities and the civil society.

Likewise, all institutions directly responsible for Open Government commitments have included an Open Government icon in their institutional web portals, to trace their progress through verification of each commitment and goal and to link back to the Open Government portal (www.gobiernoabierto.gob.gt), where all information pertaining to the initiative can be viewed and downloaded. This information includes each of the 22 commitments, the means of verification, plans and work schedules; and additional information such as the three Action Plans created to date, the list of institutions that are part of the Open Government Technical Roundtable, the meetings held, the meeting agendas and memory aids; among other information that may interest citizens.

The Point of Contact coordinates the Open Government Alliance and its 70 participating institutions, including representatives of the three branches of State (Executive, Legislative and Judicial), autonomous and decentralized public institutions, Comptroller General of Accounts, Superintendence of Tax Administration, Human Rights Ombudsman 's Office, the National Institute of Municipal Development, the National Registry of Persons, the University of San Carlos de Guatemala; as well as 20 civil society organizations; observer

entities such as USAID, OAS, Counterpart International through the Civic Participation Project, Carter Center, Public Prosecutor's Office; and the investigator for the independent revision mechanism (DOSES). The Judicial Branch participates as an observer in the Open Government Initiative.

A public call was made as of April 2016 and is currently open to participation of interested civil society organizations, members of private sector, academia and public entities, to join and participate in the Guatemala Open Government Initiative. For interested parties, the email address ogp.guate@gmail.com was made available, as well as the telephone number (+502) 5931-0062, where they are provided with information on how to join the initiative.

It is important to highlight that the process of co-creation and implementation of the Plan has had the support of international cooperation. This support, especially that of several USAID-funded projects, especially the Civic Participation Project implemented by Counterpart International, has contributed to the fulfillment of the commitments and activities throughout the process towards strengthening Open Government in Guatemala. The Organization of American States and the Carter Center in Guatemala, as a promoter of the working group on Access to Public Information, have also joined the process as international donors.

2) PROCESS OF THE NATIONAL ACTION PLAN

As soon as the Open Government Point of Contact was appointed in April of 2016, she immediately began to call for participation in the initiative, initially in a working group with civil society organizations that had previously been involved with Open Government initiatives; and subsequently a public call was made and invitations were sent to the different institutions of the Executive Branch that had previously participated in the initiative, as well as other autonomous and decentralized public entities and civil society organizations. The call was to participate in a voluntary, participatory, collaborative and transparent process towards Open Government in Guatemala.

The first four meetings of the National Open Government Technical Roundtable were held in the meeting room of the Office of the General Secretariat in Guatemala of the Organization of American States (OAS), with their support.

The goal was to move forward in the recovery of the Open Government Initiative in Guatemala, and the methodology of the consultation process and co-creation of the plan was structured on methodological guidelines and practices of the OGP, as well as internal needs of the country. The open and proactive participation of citizens in the process and the limited resources available were also taken into account.

The Third National Action Plan also includes some goals from the Second National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018, to give the plan continuity. The commitments made were reviewed and a report was drafted to underline which of the commitments in the plan were important to continue. Additionally, it was established that there was duplication of goals in the course of the 48 commitments included in the Second Plan, and this was corrected in the Third National Action Plan.

Co-creation methodology: On Monday, May 12 of 2016, the Open Government Technical Roundtable approved the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018. Before specifying dates for the methodology, the Point Of Contact consulted the OGP Support Unit on deadlines for presentation of the plan for Guatemala. The process of consultation and co-creation would take four months more than expected, and the Point of Contact wanted to make sure that this delay would not cause the country to forfeit its participation in the process. The OGP Support Unit indicated that they could not grant an extension in the delivery of Action Plans, however, due to the short time available, and so that Guatemala would not generate a public notice of noncompliance, the deadline was approved for August 31, 2016. However, the plan was approved and sent to the OGP on August 11, 2017. All information related to the methodology, activities and consultation process was published on the open government website.

The methodology for the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018 was designed to draw from five central themes:

1. Access to Public Information and Institutional Archives

- 2. Technological Innovation
- 3. Citizen Participation
- 4. Accountability
- 5. Fiscal Transparency

The first stage, termed "I am Open Government", aimed to make known the concept of open government among citizens and public entities through a campaign that made public the methodology and central themes proposed for the plan and invited citizens to state their opinion and participate in space for citizen consultation through the Open Government website www.gobiernoabierto.gob.gt. This in turn generated statistics and provided valuable inputs regarding citizen opinions that were used by the technical roundtable to draft initiatives and commitments.

Meetings were also held during this first stage with representatives of State Ministries, Secretariats, State Organisms, members of the Civil Society sector and the Academy among others, to raise awareness about open government and the drafting process for the Third National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018, to collect input about programs pertinent to the subject and to establish points of contact with various institutions. During

the raising awareness stage, the support from the Organization of American States office in Guatemala was extremely helpful, facilitating a space for the OGP point of contact to meet with stakeholders about the drafting of the action plan.

The second stage, termed "Consultation Forums for Citizen Opinions about the Five Central Themes of the National Action Plan" allowed the team to define strategic goals based on citizen opinion inputs from various geographical regions throughout the country, through an open, collaborative and inclusive method in three departments: Guatemala, Quetzaltenango and Alta Verapaz. An Open Government Forum was carried out in Guatemala City as well, organized by the Organization of American States and the Guatemalan Government, with participation of representatives from different sectors of Guatemalan society.

Two thematic round tables were organized as part of the **third stage** within an open, collaborative and inclusive framework, to draft open government objectives and commitments for August of 2016 to June of 2018 and use the SMART Method criteria to set goals, objectives, deadlines and responsibilities. Technical delegates and high authorities of public entities participated in the process, as well as civil society organizations and other interested stakeholders.

And during the **fourth stage**, the Open Government Technical Roundtable evaluated commitments proposed during the consultation process. A discussion between technical representatives and leaders of different sectors led to the evaluation of initiatives, their compliance to the SMART Method, their viability, and their degree of relevance. This stage led to their inclusion in the Third National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018.

Additional meetings of the Open Government Technical Roundtable were necessary to edit and refine the 22 initiatives included in the plan, and to assure their compliance to Open Government principles of transparency, collaboration and participation. The goals were set to conform to the following criteria: Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant and Timely, as per the SMART goal-setting method.

A consensus was reached between technical delegates, representatives of different sectors, stakeholders and members of the Open Government Technical Roundtable, which led to a high-level roundtable attended by the President and Vice President of the Republic, the President of the Judicial Body (Organismo Judicial), the diplomatic community, high authorities to be held accountable for the 22 commitments, institutional points of contact and delegates of the technical roundtable, during which goals and initiatives included in the National Open Government Action Plan were validated and approved.

The methodology approved on May 12 of 2016 by the Open Government Technical Roundtable is comprised of nine major stages. An extraordinary technical meeting was later added to stage 6, as well as two extraordinary technical meetings during stage 7 to refine

and systematize commitments proposed during the consultation phase. Also added to the methodology were five technical work roundtable meetings to edit and improve wording, unify goals and adapt open government principles to the plan.

OGP points of contact from Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras participated in the Sub-Regional Meeting of the Northern Triangle of Central America, which took place in San Salvador, El Salvador from July 19 to 21 of 2016, as well as representatives of civil society organizations from the three countries. During this meeting, Guatemala agreed to send the OGP Support Unit the document for revision and possible recommendations before final validation and approval of the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018, to be sent by the point of contact on the appointed date.

A) PARTICIPATION AND CO-CREATION THROUGHOUT THE OGP CYCLE

Throughout the development process for the three National Open Government Action Plans, participation has been especially noticeable during the process of co-creation for the Third National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018. The first Plan (2012) was created with no participation from citizens and/or civil society. The second plan had participation from three civil society organizations and entities from the Executive branch of government during the drafting of the plan.

The goal was for the Third National Open Government Action Plan to be drafted through a transparent, participatory and collaborative process with participation from all public institutions, representatives of civil society and international cooperation. Spaces were provided for citizen participation, especially during the Open Consultation Forums in four departments countrywide. In addition, the process for recovery of the initiative increased participation from 12 institutions to 70 diverse and representative entities.

After 88 proposals for commitments, members of the roundtable reached a consensus on 22 commitments divided into five work themes. These commitments are currently being followed up on and audited by civil society organizations that participate in Open Government.

B) PARTICIPATION AND CO-CREATION DURING THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE PLAN

The participatory process for drafting the plan was open and new actors were invited to participate alongside those stakeholders that had previously participated in the Open Government initiative. Civil society organizations, Ministries and Secretariats, the Congress

of the Republic of Guatemala, autonomous and decentralized entities such as the Comptroller General of Accounts, the University of San Carlos de Guatemala, the Superintendence of Tax Administration, the National Registry of Persons and the Human Rights Ombudsman's Office; as well as the National Institute of Public Administration, the Secretariat of Science and Technology, the Ministry of the Interior, the National Institute of Municipal Development, and the National Association of Municipalities, among other institutions that have joined the Open Government Technical Roundtable.

There are currently 70 entities that make up the Open Government Technical Roundtable. They are also collaborating in the compliance and accompaniment of the 22 commitments of the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018. The co-creation methodology and process is described in the Action Plan, as well as the way in which more civil society organizations joined the process. Today, they are part of an alliance that coordinates issues on Open Government, Transparency, Accountability, Citizen Participation and many other related issues (http://gobiernoabierto.gob.gt/tercer-plan/).

All participating institutions, including civil society organizations and USAID through the Civic Participation Project, supported the co-creation process to the extent of their possibilities, in both logistic and financial aspects.



On May 25 of 2016, the institutions that currently formed the Open Government Technical Roundtable were convened to discuss the methodology and activity schedule for

Guatemala, Quetzaltenango and Alta Verapaz consultations: civil society organizations, the Executive Branch, the Congress of the Republic, the General Comptroller's Office, San Carlos University of Guatemala, the National Registry of Persons (RENAP) and the Superintendence of Tax Administration (SAT).

Interest and collaboration showed by all public institutions and civil society organizations towards achieving the best results possible was at that time very valuable, especially with the limitations and time constraints of all. It is important to recognize the support the San Carlos University of Guatemala, that donated facilities, helped with logistics and provided local facilitators for the three regional forums, as well as the collaboration and support received during the open consultation forums, thematic roundtables and technical open government meetings from the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) through Counterpart International, organization that executes a project for strengthening of civil society organizations.

An open call for hiring of facilitators was necessary for regional forums. Ten facilitators were selected and divided by the five central work themes. Each topic also had a government facilitator and a representative of the civil society sector, trained on June 6 of 2016 and certified the Institute of Public Administration (INAP). Facilitators were later in charge of holding discussions with citizens and collecting input and citizen opinions for drafting of commitments during thematic roundtables.



It was established in the methodology for the action plan that two rounds of thematic roundtables would be held, based on the five central work themes. Citizen opinions were collected and systematized after each open consultation forum, and civil society organization presented advances in commitments made in the second plan for each thematic area. This generated a baseline for commitments proposed for the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018.

The Open Government Point of Contact explained how each commitment should be structured, based on the SMART method and the template provided by the OGP. Later, during the second round of thematic working groups, commitment proposals were presented by representatives of public institutions, civil society organizations and citizens interested in contributing ideas for central work themes. Thematic roundtables were carried out with support from the following institutions:

On August 11, during the meeting of the High Level Open Government Technical Roundtable, the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018 was validated and approved in the Hall of Flags in the National Palace of Culture, in the presence of high-level government officials responsible for each of the 22 commitments, the President of Guatemala, the President of the Judicial Body, and a representative of the Congress of the Republic. All information on the co-creation process is published in the action plan and can be found in detail online, at www.gobiernoabierto.gob.gt.

C) PARTICIPATION, CO-CREATION, IMPLEMENTATION, MONITORING AND DRAFTING OF NATIONAL OPEN GOVERNMENT ACTION PLAN

The process of compliance with the Third National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018 began immediately upon its approval. Fifteen working groups were formed in the first meeting of the roundtable, and all members were able to register to participate in monitoring compliance with the 22 commitments by clicking on a link. The methodology used is based on those directly responsible for each commitment convening their technical working group, and sharing and validating the process with all members, together with the representatives of public entities, civil society organizations and observers who accompany the process.

3) RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE INDEPENDENT REVIEW MECHANISM

The information that is currently available is the half-term report presented by the Independent Review Mechanism (IRM). The IRM has indicated that the final National Open Government Action Plan is still under review, and the criteria that will be taken into account as recommendations of the IRM correspond to the mid-term evaluation of the second Action Plan.

According to the evaluation of the Independent Review Mechanism, the comparative results of the first and second National Open Government Action Plans are the following:

The recommendations of the Independent Review Mechanism based on the mid-term assessment were the following:

a) Focus the Action Plan towards less, but more ambitious, reforms within the framework of national priorities.

- b) Create a space for collaboration between the Government and Civil Society Organizations, to promote Open Government.
- c) Ensure compliance with transparency, participation and collaboration standards during the process of co-creation and implementation of the National Open Government Action Plan.
- d) Promote a culture of citizen reporting and of filling complaints among State employees.
- e) Encourage and maintain spaces for open participation and collaboration throughout the process of co-creation and implementation of the National Open Government Action Plan, so that more civil society organizations, public entities and observers join the process.
- f) Promote the use of means of verification and indicators that prove compliance with commitments included in the National Open Government Action Plan.

Initially, the co-creation and approval of the National Open Data Policy was scheduled to be completed in June of 2018. The team is making an effort to complete it 6 months before, on December 31 of 2017, so that it can be implemented with the Ministry of Finance and the Ministry of Education from January to June of 2018. International cooperation has provided funding, especially the Organization of American States (OAS) and the USAID Civic Participation Project implemented by Counterpart International. This funding has been key in carrying out activities such as Thematic Roundtables for co-creation of the policy with civil society organizations, research centers, academia and the media. Implementation of the policy is planned in the Fourth National Open Government Action Plan, so that the state of Guatemala has the objectives, goals and indicators necessary to be included in the international Open Data Barometer. The National Open Data Policy is part of the natural evolution of the right of access to public information, which is why it will at all times be subject to the provisions of the Human Rights Ombudsman's Office.

The Congress of the Republic appointed a work team to fulfill these commitments and to give them continuity. The Manager of the Unit for Free Access to Information leads the team, along with the Social Communication Manager of Congress and a technician from the Public Expenditure and Accountability Unit. The team must attend all meetings of the Open Government Technical Roundtable, find alliances with civil society organizations, and effectively fulfill commitments and goals of the institution. Additional information This team is also responsible for the commitments and goals of the Congress of the Republic and the Alliance for an Open Congress in Guatemala -ACAG-, which seeks to open Congress information to the public. The budget of the commitment has not yet been approved. There are currently three persons directly in charge of fulfilling this commitment as well as the team of the Social Communication Department, currently working on feeding social networks and producing videos. The Red Ciudadana team, it must be said, has created the "Citizen Opinion" tool as well as the manual for use and management. The reform to the Internal Organic Regulation of the Minfin has also been considered as part of this commitment, in order to institutionalize the topic of Open Government and Fiscal Transparency, through the creation of a Vice Ministry of Transparency and Fiscal Evaluation and a Directorate of Fiscal Transparency. This process began with a rapid development to meet the deadline, but the Governmental Agreement will be used to include the changes contained in the two recent Amendments to the State Contracting Law (Decrees 9-2015 and 46-2016), which has delayed compliance a bit.

What is the problem that the commitment addresses? (Status quo or problem to be solved)	In Guatemala, the human right to health is recognized both in the Political Constitution of the Republic and in the national Health Code. The State has ratified the different international instruments that support it, including the International Covenant on Economic, Social, and Cultural Rights (ICESCR) and its optional protocol. Regarding the principle of non-discrimination, the Convention for the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination against Women, the Convention of Belém Do Para, ILO Convention 169 and the International Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples have been ratified. Despite this, the Guatemalan society continues to have problems with high levels of social inequality, racism and discrimination based on sex/gender, which, combined with the limited social participation, low levels of schooling and other social, economic and political problems result in violations to the human right to health. The Inclusive Health Model (MIS) emerged in 2000 as a solution to this problem; a long-term strategy to promote a reform of the health system that is based on rights and focuses on comprehensive and inclusive care that aims to reduce inequities. More than 16 years after its inception, the Ministry of Public Health and Social Assistance (MSPAS) is encouraging strengthening of capacities to fulfill this right to health, by focusing on the first level of attention as this is considered a key element in the public health system. This strategy has been proven to be effective in making attention universal and reducing maternal mortality, infant mortality due to diarrhea, and neonatal mortality. This due to the coordination with people, families, Mayan therapists, grandmothers, midwives and other community actors, with intercultural relevance, gender equity and an environmental perspective.					
What is the commitment? (Main goal)	To implement the Inclusive health model (Modelo Incluyente de Salud –MIS-) in all sectors and territories throughout the country.					
How will it help solve the problem? 





TRAINING IN ACCESS TO PUBLIC INFORMATION AND INSTITUTIONAL ARCHIVES	The permanent program for training in Access to Public Information was established, and various activities have been carried out, such as the first Certification in Access to Public Information (May-August 2017) with 48 graduates that include staff of public institutions (state agencies), municipalities, autonomous and decentralized entities, civil society and journalists. Also, 15 workshops were held, including a workshop on Access to Public Information Law, with the participation of 912 people from the following institutions: Segeplan, Sesan, Inap, Mineco, Minex, Mingob, Mindef, Senacyt and MSPAS. The second certification is currently in progress.
TRAINING TO EDUCATIONAL PERSONNEL IN ACCESS TO PUBLIC INFORMATION AND INSTITUTIONAL ARCHIVES MINEDUC/USAC	The sixth cohort of the Academic Program for Teacher Professional Development (PADEP) included participation of 6,157 teachers (1,304 for Pre Primary education and 4,852 for Intercultural and Bilingual Primary education) and LAIP content is currently being taught in the Legislation and Administration in Education course of the Teacher Updating Program. Fundazúcar reports that in 2017, 10,180 teachers from official Pre Primary and Primary schools in the departments of Santa Rosa, Escuintla, Suchitepéquez and Retalhuleu were trained. Teachers from Pre Primary levels and all of the Primary grades participated. Participation was positive in Law of Public Access to Information courses, and teachers reported feeling motivated after receiving documents with strategies for communicating this knowledge to students and parents (see Means of verification).

Goal 2, that contemplates implementation of the communication strategy from December of 2016 to June 2018, includes materials used in social media, news coverage in the Guatemalan news agency, media monitoring and mentions in the "Informe nacional" 3-minute news capsule on open television, Mondays through Fridays. A workshop is planned for communicators of all institutions in the executive branch and other agencies interested in participating in Open Government, as part of the Comprehensive Communication Strategy.

The SIGES Program Report 94 was published in open data format on the webpage, as was the Protocol for Requesting the Delivery of Humanitarian Aid, the Certification for Updating Approval of the Protocol approved by the National Council. Lists of deliveries to mayors were also published, and a report prepared by the Direction of Logistics was published monthly, with numbers, quantities and places were resources were allocated and humanitarian aid was destined. Reports of the Direction of Response were also published, specifying incidents and detailing people and infrastructure affected. A toll-free number for complaints and nonconformities was enabled, as well as a form that can be filled out with contact details for each complaint. These documents can be found on the Conred official website https://conred.gob.gt, under the icon for Open Government.

ACTIONS TOWARDS AN OPEN AND PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING PROCESS

MINFIN, SEGEPLAN, CGC, Congress of the Republic

Sixteen Open Budget Workshops were held to allow civil society organizations to participate in developing the State Budget. They gave suggestions and recommendations to improve the distribution of budget ceilings and the financing of institutional programs, using institutional analyses carried out by internationally well-known experts. These forums were transmitted online and citizens were able to comment on the event and fill out online surveys. Thirteen public institutions presented, 84 civil society organizations participated and there were 1,872 total participants. Workshops were also held with civil society organizations to discuss Open Government and Transparency Regulations, to include them in the Budget (included in Chapter III, articles 17 to 26). As part of the development process, the following workshops were held: Macroeconomic and Fiscal Projections (Minfin, Banguat and SAT), Tax Risks, About the Geographical List of Works and about contributions to NGOs. There was direct and proactive participation of various CSOs in these events, and a final report was drafted to present the results. On the part of Conadur, initiatives for investment in 2018 were presented, a situation that allowed for all five goals of this commitment to be marked as completed.

ACTIONS TOWARDS COMPLIANCE WITH THE INTERNATIONAL MONETARY FUND (IMF) FISCAL TRANSPARENCY CODE AND MANUAL

MINFIN

The IMF was asked to practice the Fiscal Transparency Assessment, which was carried out in the months of March and April 2016. A chapter on tax risks was included in the 2017 Budget Bill. A consolidated spending matrix was developed for spending groups 4 and 5: Current Transfers and Capital Transfers. The Convention on mutual Administrative Assistance in Tax Matters was approved by Decree No. 9-2017. This allows Guatemala to leave the list of countries that do not collaborate with exchanging tax information, and for the country to be included in the list of those that collaborate satisfactorily (two steps up in the qualification). A proposal for Reforms to the Internal Organic Regulation of the Minfin is also in the works, to

ACTIONS AIMED AT IMPROVING THE AVAILABILITY AND QUALITY OF BUDGET INFORMATION MINFIN	create a Vice Ministry and a specific Direction for Transparency and Fiscal Evaluation, as part of the Minfin Transparency Agenda. These reforms will include the changes that derive from two recent reforms of the State Procurement Law (Decrees Nos. 9-2015 and 46-2016), the relevant aspects of which are creating a General Procurement Registry and the converting the DNCAE in a General Direction of Acquisitions. A concrete result is the issuance of Ministerial Agreement NO. 194-2017, through which the following aspects are regulated and institutionalized: a) Definition of dependencies responsible for the issuance and publication of the 8 documents that serve as the basis for rating the Open Budget Index; b) The Dependencies are instructed that all information published on the Minfin website must be published in open data formats; c) the Open Budget process is institutionalized at the stage of budget formulation. The Open Data Users Committee was created with participation of various civil society organizations, not only to address the issue of open data, but also as a focal group to address a series of demands and topics of interest to civil society.
ACTIONS AIMED AT MOVING TOWARDS OPEN HIRING PRACTICES MINFIN	The Reverse Electronic Auction was completed: Minfin initiated purchase by ordering paper with a saving of 4% in relation to the amount executed in the previous year, and the Ministry of Communications used the system in the acquisition of Bailey type bridges. Reforms to the Guatecompras system are being implemented so that it evolves from statistical to transactional system, and allows procurement processes to be monitored from planning to adjudication, execution and results. Records will be gathered in the General Acquisitions Registry and a General Procurement Department will be created. The suitability of Guatemala adhering to the Open Government Partnership is being evaluated. Meetings and videoconferences have already been held to share the benefits of the initiative and to issue recommendations on the subject.
20 ACTIONS AIMED AT MOVING TOWARDS FISCAL TRANSPARENCY SAT	The Minfin and the SAT signed an agreement in October of 2016 to provide each other with assistance and exchange information that is relevant to the fulfillment of institutional objectives. Statistical information was also published with regard to taxes (goals and execution); queries about exempt entities; tax credit fund requests and other general queries. Studies about tax expenditures for 2009-2016 were carried out, as well as studies on VAT non-compliance for 2010-2016. Regarding accountability, work reports fro 2009 to 2016 have been published, and after Decree 37-2016 was passed, the report "The Law for strengthening fiscal transparency and governance of the SAT" was published. Also, the OECD was able to improve the country's rating in the OECD's Global Transparency Forum Standard, with support from the Minfin, the Congress of the Republic of Guatemala and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

ADVANCES IN THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE FIRST LEVEL HEALTH CARE MODEL

MSPAS

Huehuetenango, Totonicapán, Sololá, Quetzaltenango, Baja Verapaz, Quiché, Zacapa and Petén, and determined their needs in terms of human resources, furniture, equipment, vehicles, computers and other resources.

During 2017, the Ministry of Public Health and Social Assistance has strengthened the First Level of Health care with an investment of Q139,988.000 in Alta Verapaz, Chiquimula, San Marcos, Huehuetenango, Totonicapán, Sololá, Quetzaltenango, Baja Verapaz, Quiché, Zacapa and Petén; hired 4,439 professional nurses, rural health technicians, social workers, environmental sanitation inspectors, information assistants and nursing assistants.

These human resources are hired throughout the 154 municipalities that make up the previously mentioned departments, where more than 9,000 communities were actions were taken in community outreach, vaccination coverage and supplementation for children under 5 years of age and women of childbearing age, as well as comprehensive healthcare for families, communities and other activities.

A budget of Q95,613,729 was allocated for the provision of furniture, equipment and supplies to 494 health posts in these communities; computer equipment was acquired for registration of MSPAS instruments, medications and surgical medical equipment. Vehicles for distribution of medicines and supplies to health posts were given maintenance.

Budgets for the departments of Retalhuleu, Suchitepéquez, Santa Rosa, Sacatepéquez, Jalapa, Jutiapa and Izabal were reorganized to strengthen health services and provide furniture, equipment and supplies.

Skills and knowledge were strengthened through workshops for 10,343 MSPAS workers in topics such as Community Outreach and Negotiation, Management Cycles, Comprehensive Attention to Individuals, Population Counts and Community Sketches.

The MSPAS will gradually continue to strengthen the three levels of care, by strengthening capacities in health areas and hospitals.

ACTIONS THAT CONTRIBUTE TO IMPROVING THE QUALITY OF EDUCATION

MINEDUC

Commitment 22, for which the Ministry of Education is responsible, has full compliance. The following results were reported. For Goal 1, to ensure timely delivery of meals and supplies at the beginning of the school year, to publish progress in the delivery of school supplies to institutions with and without OPF. For the first time since the allocation of funds for the school meal program, disbursements were delivered (Q226.1 million at the end of January, Q200.6 million in May, and A157.7 million in July) to parent organizations (OPF). Q53.2 million were also distributed to schools without parent organizations. Execution up to August 31 of 2017 was: a) School meals: Q662.5 million for 2,337,365 students in 26,978 schools; b) School supplies: 110.5 million to 2,023,970 students in 23,230 schools; c) Educational materials (didactic bag): Q19.3 million for 86,884 teachers in 20,661 schools.

Specific activities: A technical working group was formed with the Mineduc, Minfin, civil society and open government to address the challenges of the allocation and execution of financial resources for meals, school supplies and educational materials. Regarding reduction of school failure in the first grade, 16,031 schools implemented the school registry for first grade, or 99% of the total. This shows that 82,000 students need reinforcement and more than 16,000 students are at risk of abandonment. This information is being followed up on. A technical working roundtable was set up with several directions (see timetable), the school risk registry was included in the school calendar, meetings with parents were highlighted and an automated web platform was developed in the Educational Registration System (SIRE) where school principals can register students and where information can be consulted at a municipal, department and national level. Compliance dates: Both goal 1 and goal 2 were completed in advance. (*) Source: SICOIN WEB and Resource Delivery System-SDR-MINEDUC

The following achievements can be added to those highlighted by the Open Government Point of Contact:

- Monthly meetings of the Open Government Technical Roundtable for progress and compliance with the National Open Government Action Plan. Exchange of information, initiatives and open government mechanisms between 70 participating entities (public institutions, civil society and observers). The meetings are held in the National Palace of Culture, and constitute a space for participation, collaboration and especially transparency, as they are open since April of 2016 to multi-stakeholder participation. The technical team hopes that civil society organizations interested in the subject, the business sector and the academic sector join, by contacting open.government committee and other work groups.
- Monthly meetings of the Point of Contact with Civil Society Organizations and observers, to closely monitor fulfillment of the 22 commitments and establish a communication channel that will strengthen the Open Government Initiative.
- In addition, 10 public institutions were trained in Open Government: Segeplan, Sesan, Inap, Mineco, Minex, Mingob, Mindef, Senacyt, Conred and the Judicial Branch, for a total of 562 trained authorities, decision makers and other public servants. Two Open Government training workshops were conducted for civil society, in which 71 people were trained. This was achieved with the support of the Institute of Public Administration (Inap) and the USAID Civic Participation Project implemented by Counterpart International. The Civic Participation Project attended the request of the Point of Contact without hesitation, and offered full support for training activities. The new cycle of trainings for public institutions and citizens is currently underway.
- It is important to mention that two certifications in Open Government have been created, open to the participation of both public servants and the general public, with no cost to participants.
- The Open Government website was designed and launched (www.gobiernoabierto.gob.gt) and is regularly updated with information on the initiative and compliance with the 22 commitments.

- Participation in the Open Government Technical Roundtable has remained active and is open to participation of various sectors of society.
- A technical headquarters was established for the Guatemala Open Government Initiative, as part of the President's priority for Open and Effective Public Management in the Ministry of Public Finance.
- Guatemala, as a result of the co-creation and implementation of the Third National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018, was considered by the Alliance for Open Government (AGA) and the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) as a leader in the implementation of innovative strategies for Open Government in Latin America, and for its tendency to move towards an Open State.
- The technical team is coordinating the OECD Study on Open Government; "An Open State for all Guatemala" will be carried out in Guatemala.
- A series of virtual and digital tools and mechanisms have been implemented to facilitate compliance with the 22 commitments, including the publication of means of verification and the registration of participants in different work groups.
- Lead implementing agencies and responsible parties for the 22 commitments co-created 15 working plans, plans and timelines for each of the 22 commitments, to achieve greater progress in the Action Plan.
- Collaboration and cooperation between parties is one of the achievements observed at this stage of the Open Government Initiative.

CONSULTATION PROCESS ON MID-TERM SELF-EVALUATION RESULTS FOR THE NATIONAL OPEN GOVERNMENT ACTION PLAN

a) A citizen consultation was carried out as part of the self-assessment process and following the standards for the Open Government Initiative. The Mid-Term Self-Assessment had to be published for at least two weeks on the website www.gobiernoabierto.gob.gt, and in the case of Guatemala it was published more than two weeks, from September 7 to September 29, 2017. Despite the call for opinions on the Self-Assessment Report, only two messages were received about its content and about the results of the evaluation. The comments are included below, as well as a photograph of the space on the website where the report was published.

- 3) What conclusions would you highlight in compliance with commitments?
- 4) What do you consider to be the lessons learned in this process of co-creation and implementation of the National Open Government Action Plan?

5) PROGRESS OF ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA (OPTIONAL)

Governments can briefly explain any activity to improve their qualification in OGP eligibility criteria.

Guatemala joined the Open Government Partnership (OGP) in 2011, through compliance with the minimum eligibility criteria. However, through the process for co-creation and implementation of the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018 Guatemala has made great progress in these criteria. Transparency, participation and collaboration in the process resulted in an Agenda for Transparency, Accountability, Anticorruption and Development based on the following work themes:

- 1) Access to Public Information and Institutional Archives
- 2) Technological Innovation
- 3) Citizen Participation
- 4) Accountability
- 5) Fiscal Transparency

Results are evident and verifiable. Progress and achievements have been included in the Mid-Term Self-Assessment Report for the 22 commitments of the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018, institutions have been strengthened, there is evidence of compliance with public policies and application of international standards in a technical and institutional manner, and there is evidence of great strides towards transparency and development for Guatemala. Likewise, it is evident that participating public institutions have shown a will to be directly responsible for fulfilling the commitments, including the autonomous and decentralized public institutions that have joined the process in a collaborative and participatory manner.

6) KNOWLEDGE SHARING AND LEARNING

During the process of implementation and co-creation of the Open Government Action Plan, the Point of Contact and various civil society organizations had the opportunity to participate in the Regional Summit of the Americas, held in May of 2017 in Montevideo, Uruguay, as well as the Open Government Partnership Global Summit held in December of 2016 in Paris, France.

The Point of Contact also collaborated with the Point of Contact from Panama, sharing aspects of the methodology for co-creation of the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018, the structure of fiscal transparency commitments and co-creation processes for public expenditure observatories.

We also collaborated with the Government of Costa Rica, sharing information on how the Open Government Certification was implemented in Guatemala.

Communication was maintained with the Open Government partnership in Honduras, so that they could share with Guatemala their experience with Open Budgets.

Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras (through their points of contact, public entities, civil society and donors), had the opportunity to participate in three meetings Northern Triangle Open Government during 2016 and 2017.

7) CONCLUSIONS, OTHER INITIATIVES AND NEXT STEPS:

A) LESSONS LEARNED

In the process of implementation of Open Government commitments, the technical team has realized that it is necessary to analyze budgets and timelines before assuming a commitment, as well as the technological and logistical limitations for implementation. It is also important to establish prior communication with donors to ensure that they have access to resources that can support fulfillment of commitments during implementation.

It is also necessary to co-create commitments or goals (milestones) that respond to specific and prioritized needs and facts.

In the case of Guatemala, co-creation of the methodology has been a positive experience. However, for co-creation of the next plan a budget must be made beforehand to ensure that resources are available for developing the different activities contemplated in the methodology.

It is also important to teach representatives of public entities, civil society organizations, the private sector, the academic sector, aid workers, observers, citizens and journalists to draft Open Government commitments, because the greatest difficulty can be found in designing them before implementation.

The team has found strengths and opportunities in the execution of the Open Government Action Plan, such as the increase in citizen participation for the improvement of public services and management.

B) OTHER INITIATIVES (optional)

As was described earlier in this report, other initiatives have been implemented such as the training programs on Access to Public Information and Open Government with the National Institute of Public Administration (Inap), the Carter Center, the Point of Contact, the Human Rights Ombudsman, the Ministry of Public Finance, Ministry of the Interior and civil society organizations such as Guatecívica. To date, there is a group of trainers specialize in Open Government issues who donate their services to collaborative and participatory processes.

There are also some civil society organizations that support technological developments and are focused on supporting fulfillment of Open Government commitments, such as Red Ciudadana. This organization collaborated with the Ministry of Public Finance in the design and administration of a specific website for the Open Budget.

Also, in June of 2017 the Central American Institute for Fiscal Studies presented an independent evaluation on the 7 commitments for Fiscal Transparency included in the National Open Government Action Plan. Results reflected substantial advances and institutional commitment; however, the evaluation indicated that is was necessary to focus efforts on greater results and timely compliance.

C) NEXT STEPS

One of the next steps identified as a priority is the need to publicly share the advances made during implementation of the National Open Government Action Plan by institutions and civil society organizations. It is also important to show the general public how important it is to implement Open Government methodologies for a variety of issues that can generate both short and medium-term results that can improve public management.

It is important to strengthen actions for compliance of commitments and goals included in the plan, especially those with substantial and initiated advancement. This will allow the team to identify lessons learned and challenges for design and implementation of the Fourth National Open Government Action Plan 2018-2020, under an Open State approach and meeting the needs for transparency and institutional accountability, sustainable development objectives, and mainly citizen opinions on topics that must be a priority in the next plan.

The Open Government initiative must continue to be strengthened, by promoting its institutionalization and the use of mechanisms that promote greater transparency and accountability.

The plan is, in itself an agenda of transversal commitments, it will be necessary to evaluate which of these commitments could require a second phase of implementation in the next Open Government Action Plan.

D) CONCLUSIONS

- a) The National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018 is a nationwide effort with various participating sectors that have prioritized needs in five areas: 1) Access to Information and Institutional Archives; 2) Technological Innovation; 3) Citizen Participation; 4) Accountability; and 5) Fiscal Transparency, with the support or high-level government authorities and technical institutions for fulfillment of the 22 commitments established in the plan.
- b) During the first phase of implementation of the National Open Government Action Plan (August 15, 2916 to date) there is a marked improvement in openness, transparency, accountability, collaboration and participation of all the public entities directly responsible for commitments, and organizations have participated in meetings and activities of the 15 working groups and advanced in fulfillment of goals and commitments in the plan, together with members of civil society organizations and observers.
- c) The Open Government Technical Roundtable for Guatemala is positioned as a multi-actor forum and a space for participation of State entities, with delegates and representatives of the three State Organisms, autonomous and

decentralized public entities, civil society organizations and observers. This important idea of multi-stakeholder participation was resumed as of April 2016, evidencing the importance of teamwork in achieving greater results. To date, the Open Government Technical Roundtable is made up of 70 entities: 44 public entities, among them three Organisms, autonomous and decentralized entities; 20 civil society organizations; and 6 observers. However, it is necessary to include more civil society organizations, more representatives of academia and the private sector, in actions towards transparency, accountability and development for the country. This is why they have been repeatedly invited to proactively join the Open Government Initiative. Six civil society organizations sent a note to the Point of Contact indicating that, due to the political situations that had occurred during the last month in Guatemala, they had to temporarily bow out of Open Government activities. They were told that the initiative would always be open to their participation.

- d) It is important to point out that the initiative has had the technical and financial support of the USAID Civic Participation Project, implemented by Counterpart International, for fulfillment of the 22 commitments in the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018, as well as the technical support of OEA Guatemala. This support allowed for greater compliance with specific issues and commitments, such as the Open Data Policy. Also, the Open Government Technical Roundtable has been able to meet on a monthly basis thanks to the financial support of the USAID Civic Participation Project implemented by Counterpart International. Donor funding has been very beneficial to the Open Government initiative, for compliance with commitments and for the work carried out by the Open Government Point of Contact.
- e) Progress and compliance with the goals and commitments of the Plan show a higher level of compliance than the previous two Action Plans, in terms of verifying statistics and compliance indicators and in the means of verification in self-evaluation templates. Also, the Open Government website www.gobiernoabierto.gob.gt was launched and technological tools were implemented that allow for instant status updates and means of verification for the 22 commitments to be published on institutional websites and on the www.gobiernoabierto.gob.gt website, in public view and editable open data formats.

- f) Public institutions directly responsible for the commitments in the Open Government emphasize and reiterate our firm commitment with the process of compliance with the National Open Government Action Plan, based on the principles of transparency, participation and multi-actor collaboration that characterize the initiative. It is a country Agenda and the government is committed to transparency, accountability and development for Guatemala.
- g) During the process of co-creating the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018, the will of participating entities has been fundamental. Public entities, civil society organizations, donors and observers have guaranteed major progress in fulfilling commitments in the plan.
- h) The work groups that drive fulfillment of the 22 commitments have also been fundamental. Their work has allowed for a closer look into the processes and procedures that must be followed to fulfill each commitment.
- i) The greatest challenge for the Open Government Initiative in Guatemala is to continue fulfillment of commitments in the National Open Government Action Plan 2016-2018. Also, the technical, institutional and financial strengthening must continue to guarantee sustainability over time, and to move towards an open government culture among all Guatemalans.
