About the Member Pages

The Open Government Partnership was founded on two key principles: a race to the top to create policy solutions that work, and a spirit of collaboration that enables members to learn from each other's progress. A domestically owned dialogue of government and civil society reformers is at the core of OGP in 79 member countries and a growing cohort of local members.

As OGP continues to grow, these principles—and the lessons learned along the way—have allowed the Partnership to continue to increase its ambition and seek new global norms for good governance.

Many OGP members, however, do not know how they are performing relative to their peers in OGP and more broadly on implementing open government policies. Some countries, like the UK on beneficial ownership, are actually setting new standards in global leadership that can be scaled.

This section of the report aims to address the lack of performance insight. It combines findings from OGP's Independent Reporting Mechanism (IRM) (**as of December 2018**) and credible third-party datasets to assess whether OGP members are opening up government—especially in policy areas identified by the Partnership as priorities.

These pages aim to assist reformers in identifying where they can potentially use the OGP platform to achieve greater impact, and to learn from each other. It aims to provide a clearer analysis of areas of excellence and areas of improvement. Showcasing these reforms to a global audience can help strengthen the hand of reformers domestically and inspire reformers in other countries to step up.

The *Member Pages* section of the report is meant to provide readers with a comparative snapshot of achievements, progress, and areas for improvement for all OGP members. The pages display data from the IRM, as well as from respected partner organizations.

GOOD TO KNOW

Strengths and limitations of the data

The method used to construct the OGP member pages has both strengths and limitations. A key strength is the depth of the data. For example, on freedom of association, there are indicators of NGO freedom, labor freedom, and participation of women, among several others. This depth allows reformers to identify specific strengths and areas for improvement. The data also comes from numerous sources, including expert assessments, primary document reviews, and public polls.

As with any data exercise, however, the method has several important limitations:

Breadth. By design, the member pages cover only a subset of open government policy areas. They cannot capture the full scope of open government reforms and are not meant to be interpreted as an open government index.

Snapshot in time. The third-party data looks at a single point in time. Future editions of the flagship report will be able to show trends.

Data gaps. Some countries do not have data for all indicators, which makes cross-country comparisons more difficult. However, the data

is not meant to be used as an index, but rather as a policy tool for identifying next steps.

Time lag. Most third-party data was published in 2018 and collected in 2017. There is also a delay between the publication of IRM reports and the time period they assess. In addition, this report only includes IRM reports published as of December 2018. As a result, the member pages may not capture the latest reforms or OGP commitments. To help address this issue, the digital versions will be updated regularly with the latest data.

Federal systems. The third-party data necessarily assesses countries as a whole, even though in federal systems, some policies may fall under the purview of subnational governments. In these cases, the member pages lack region-specific insights and may be better used as a conversation-starter.

Print. Due to space constraints, the print version of the member pages lacks the detail found in the digital version. To access the underlying data and more easily compare OGP members, visit opengovpartnership.org/participants.

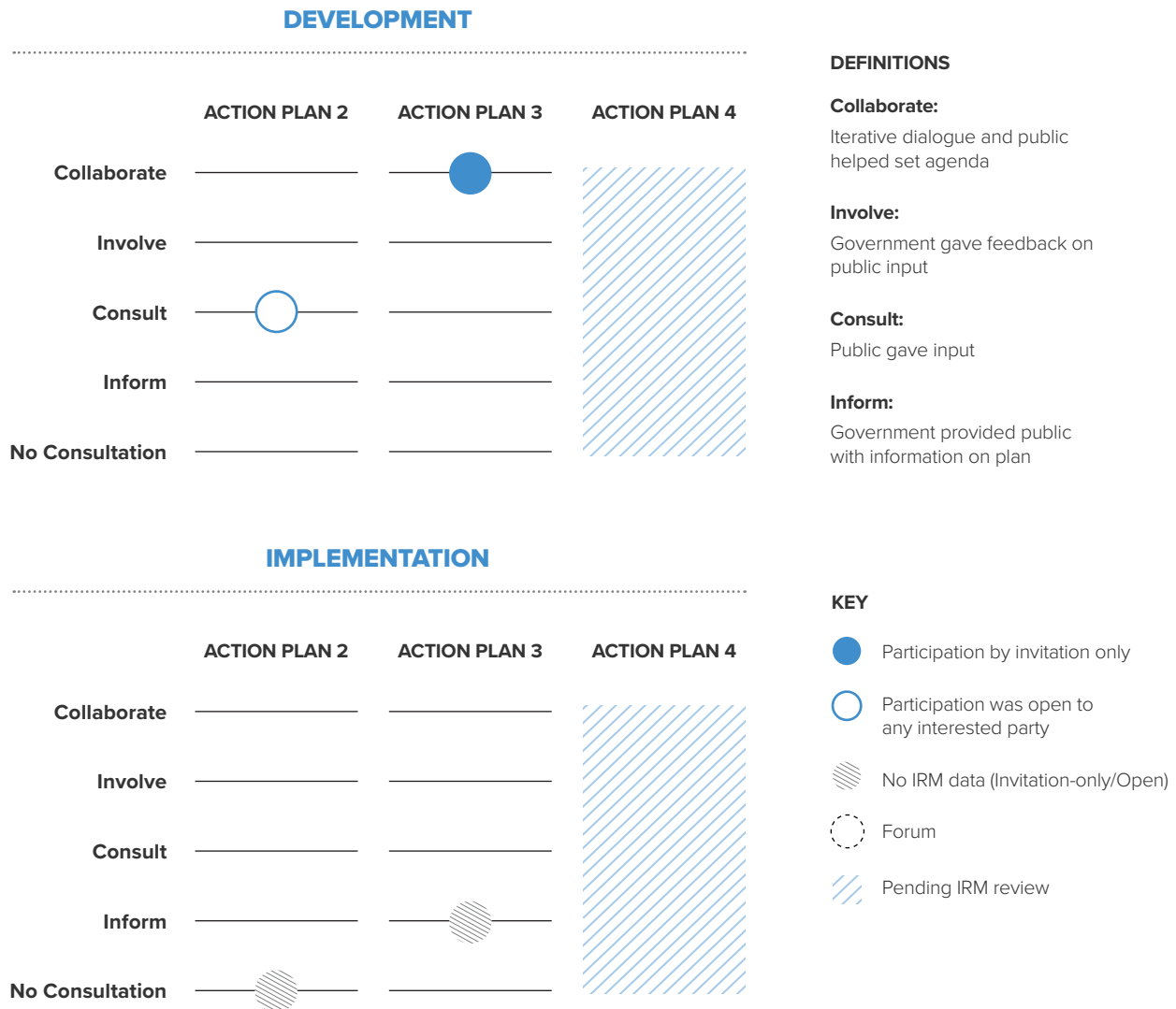

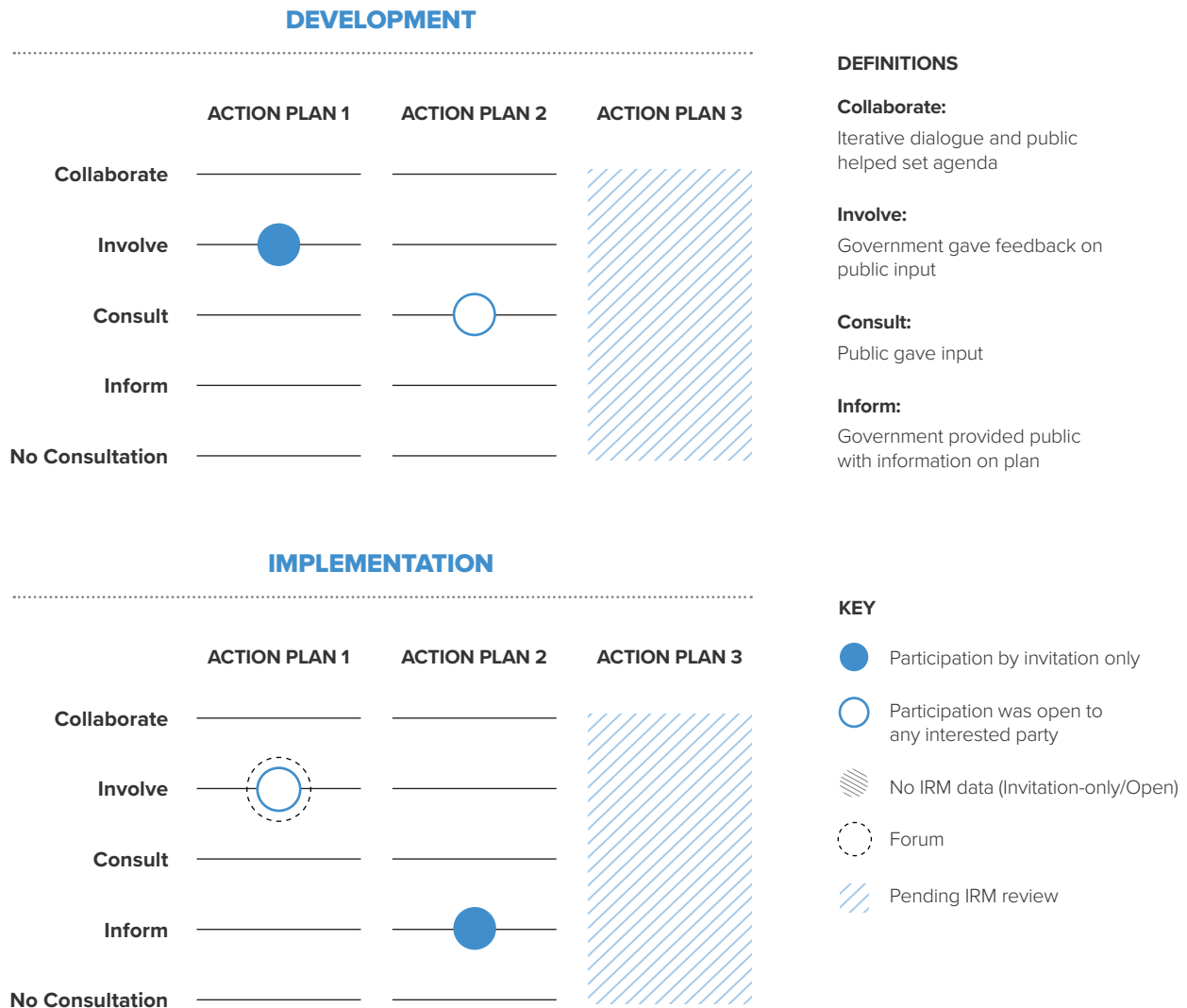

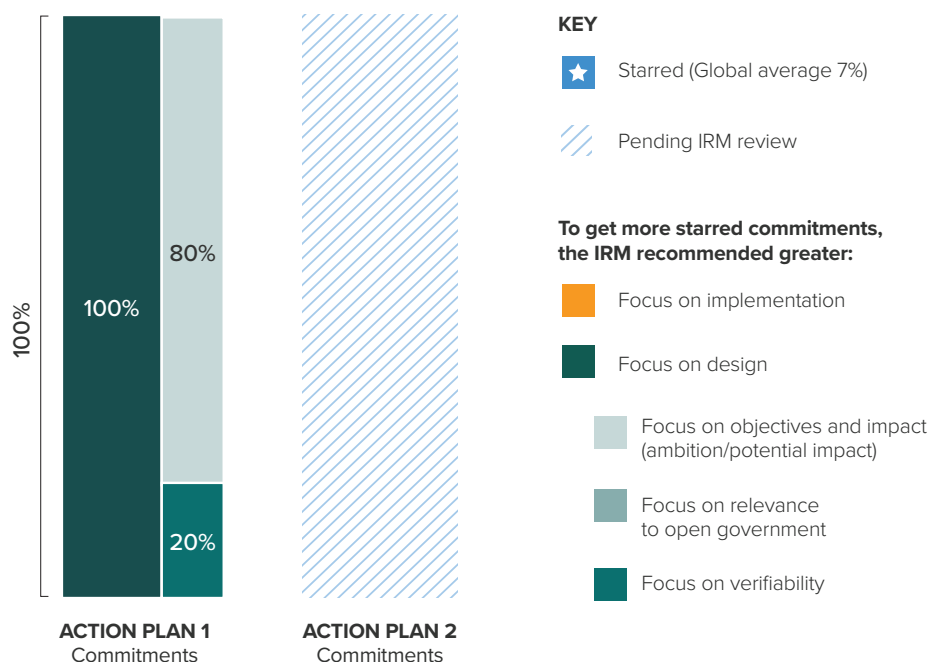

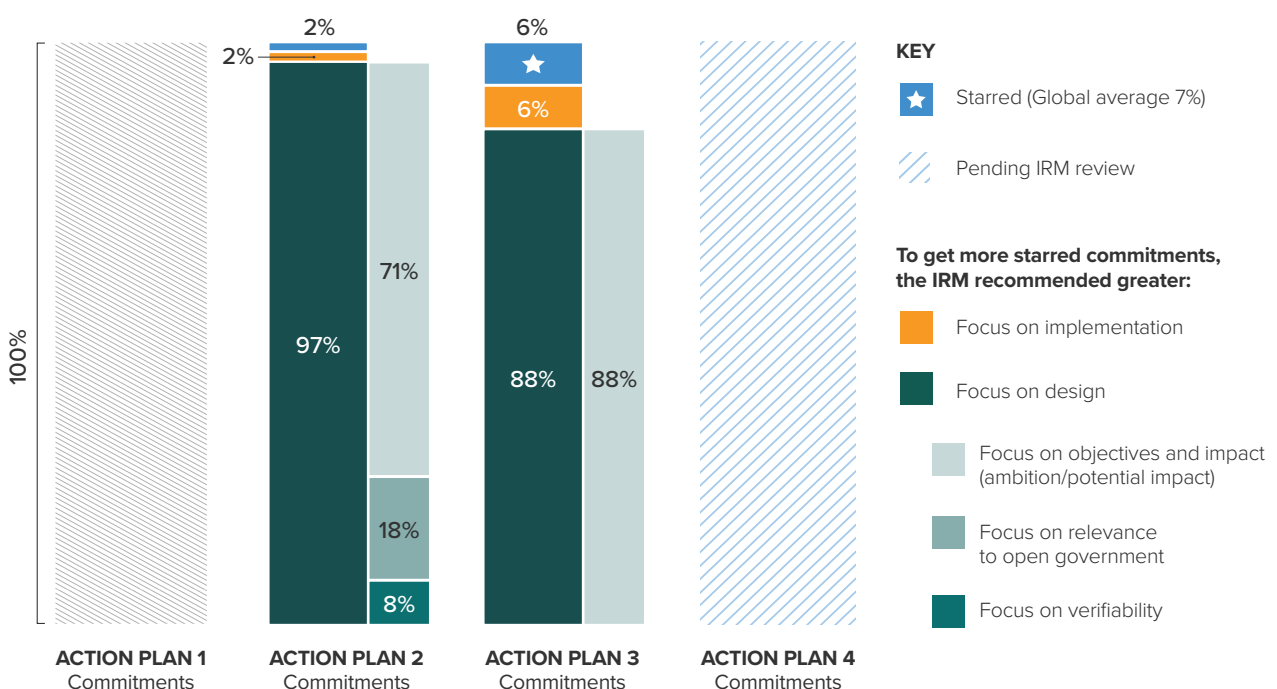

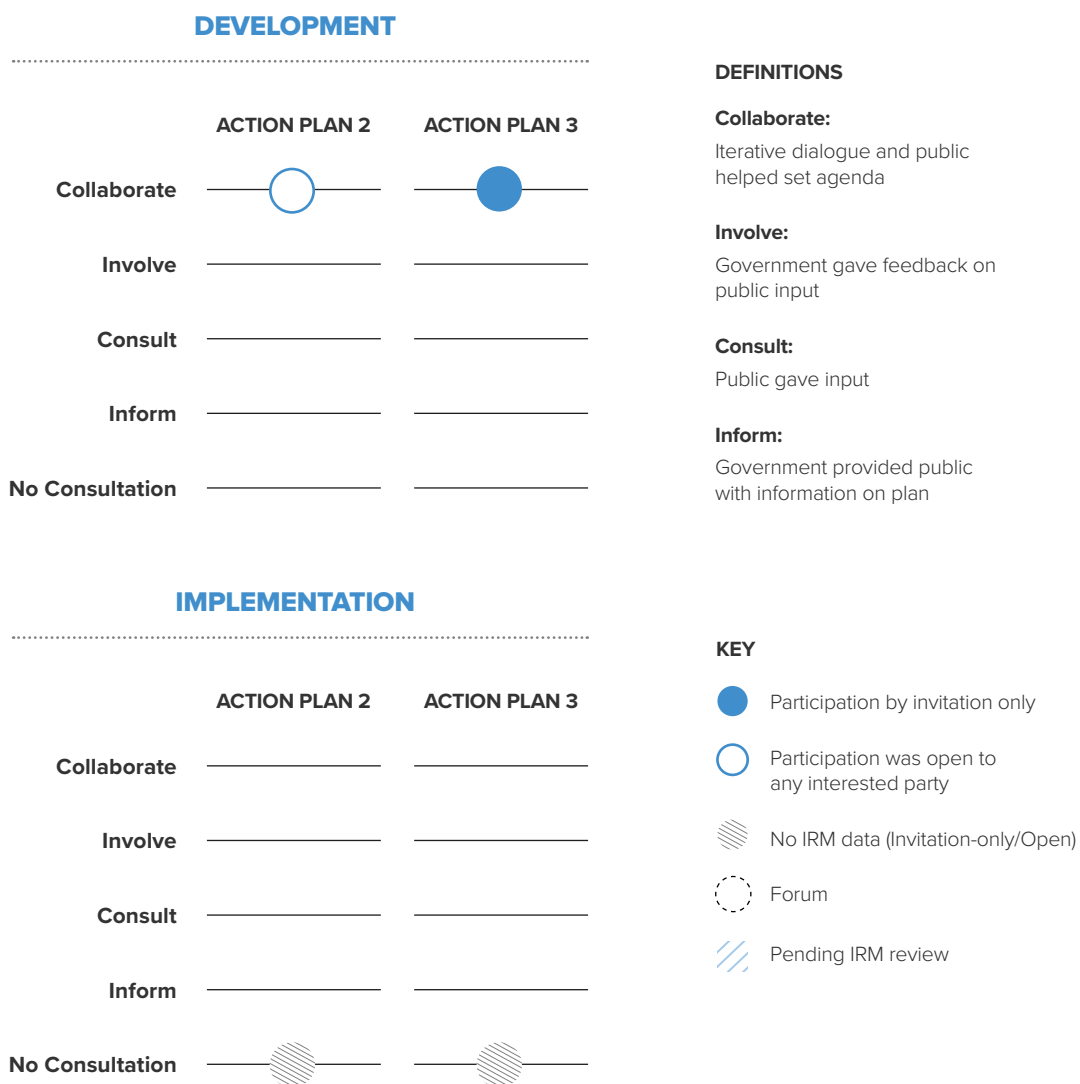

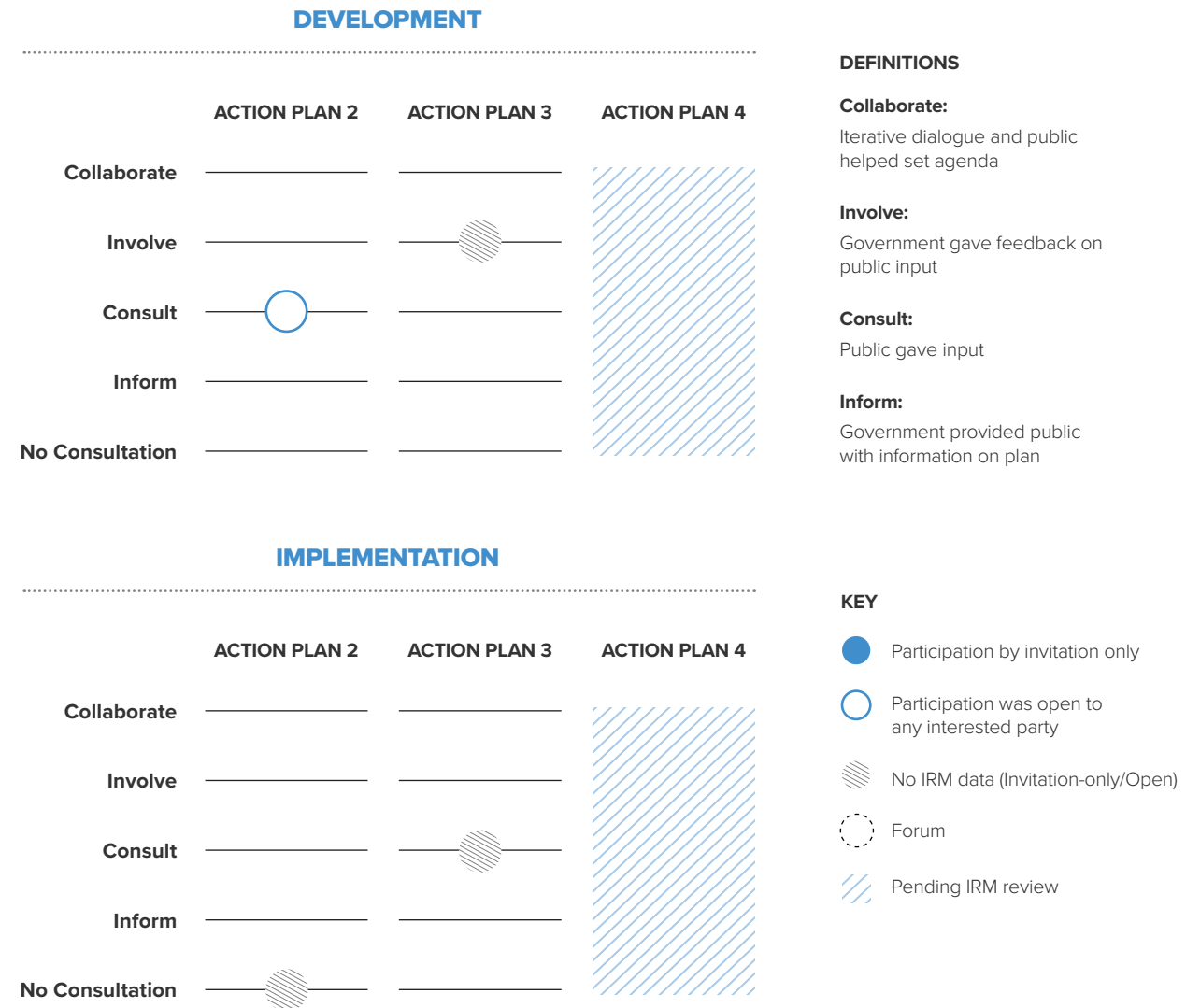

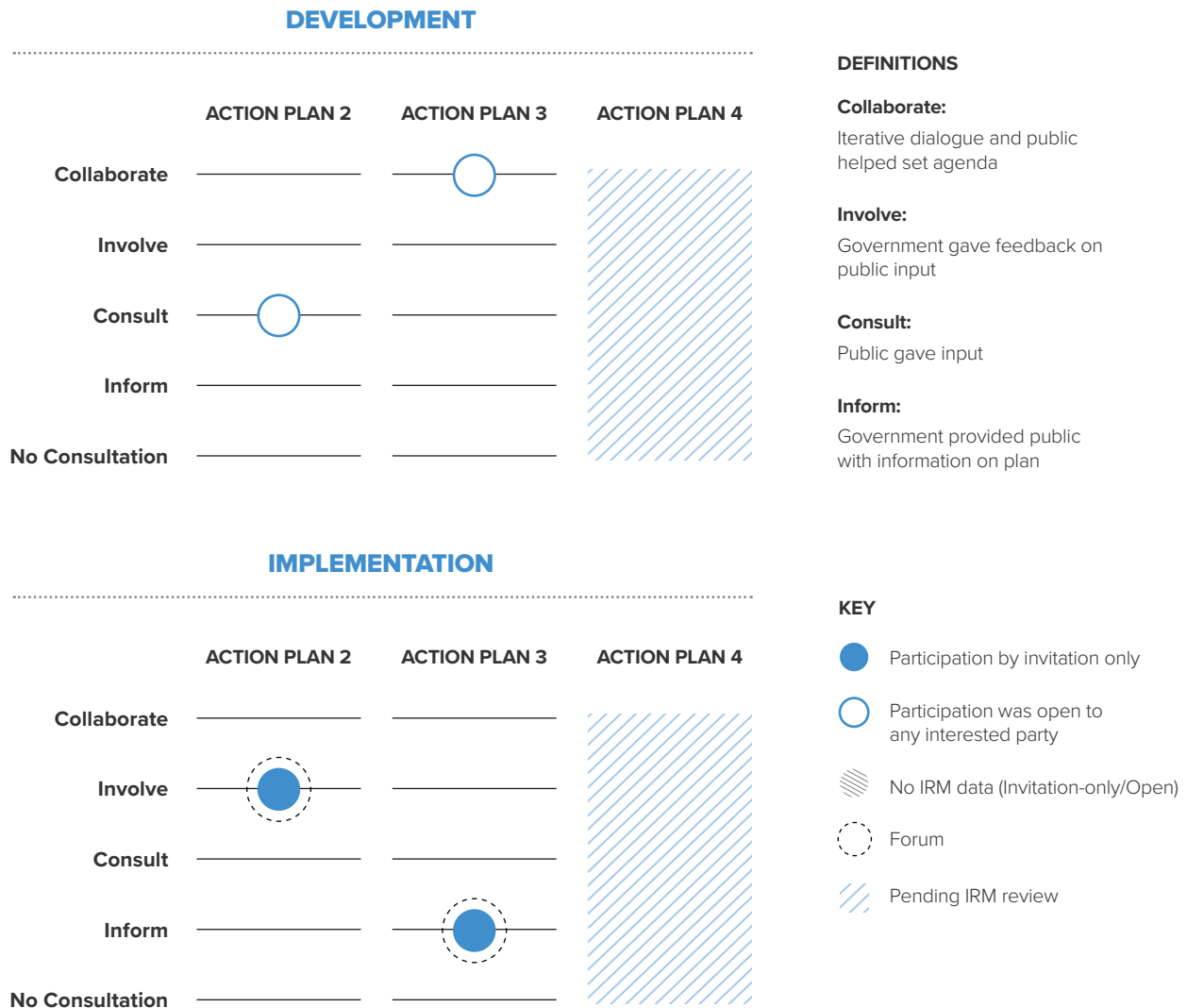

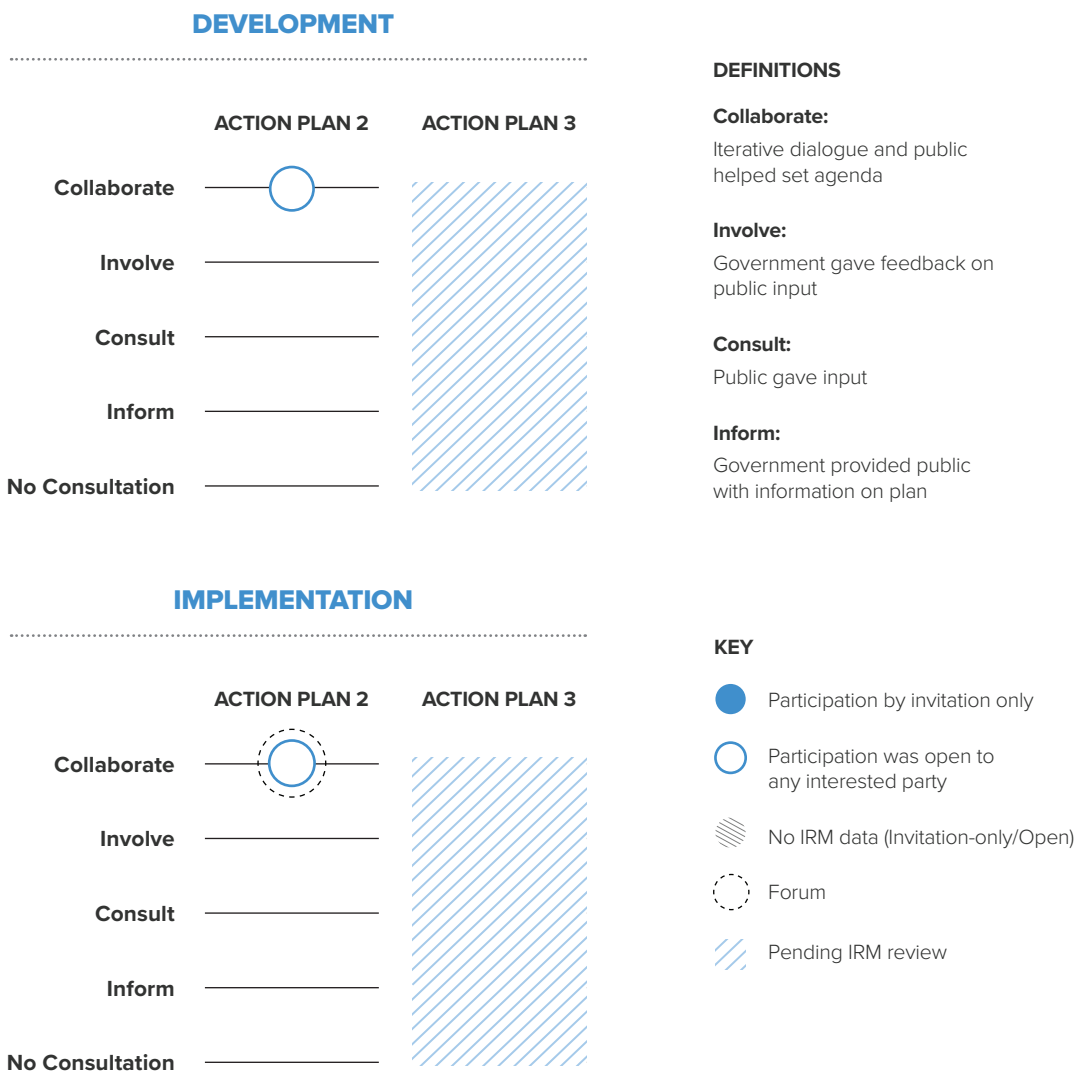

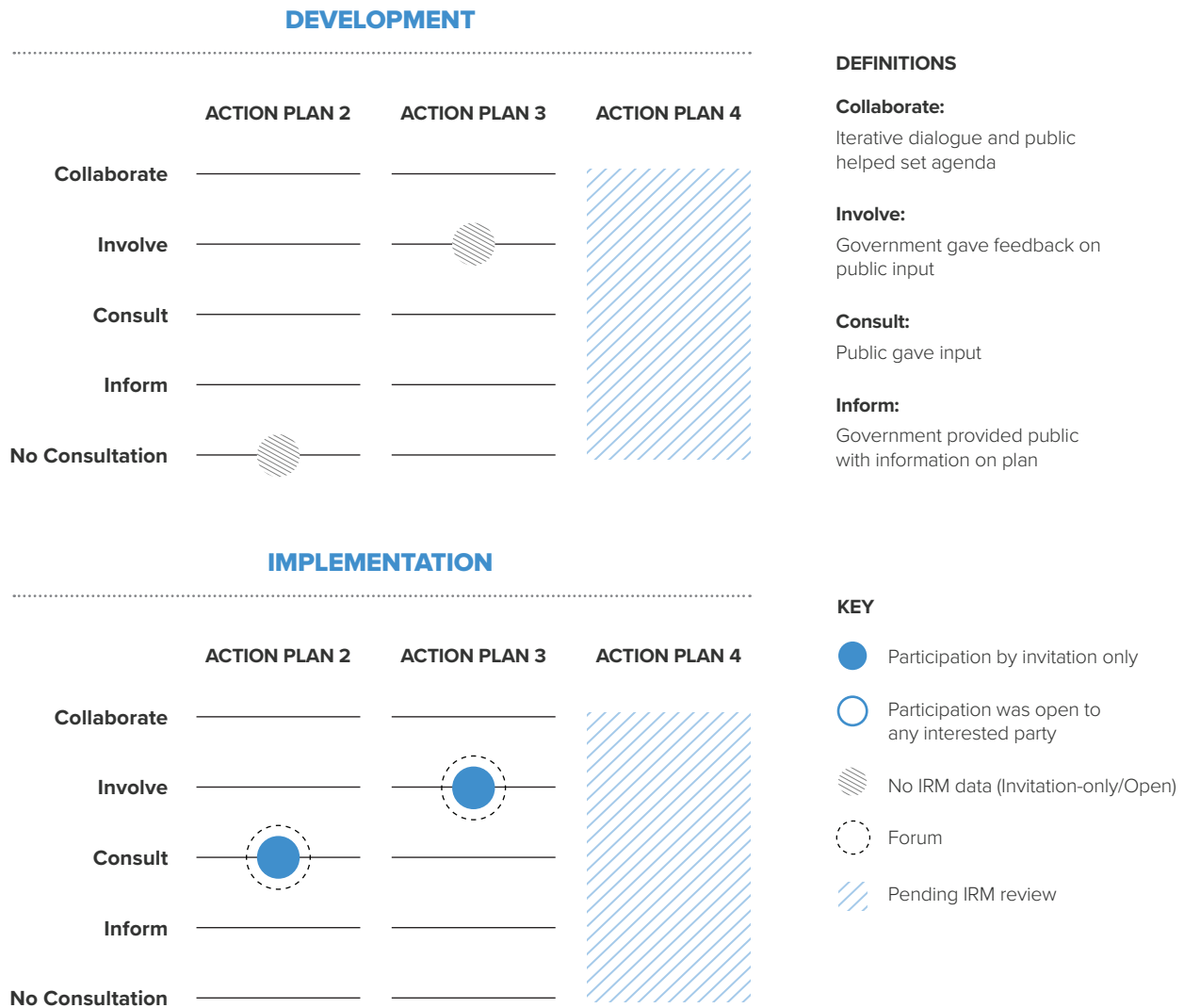

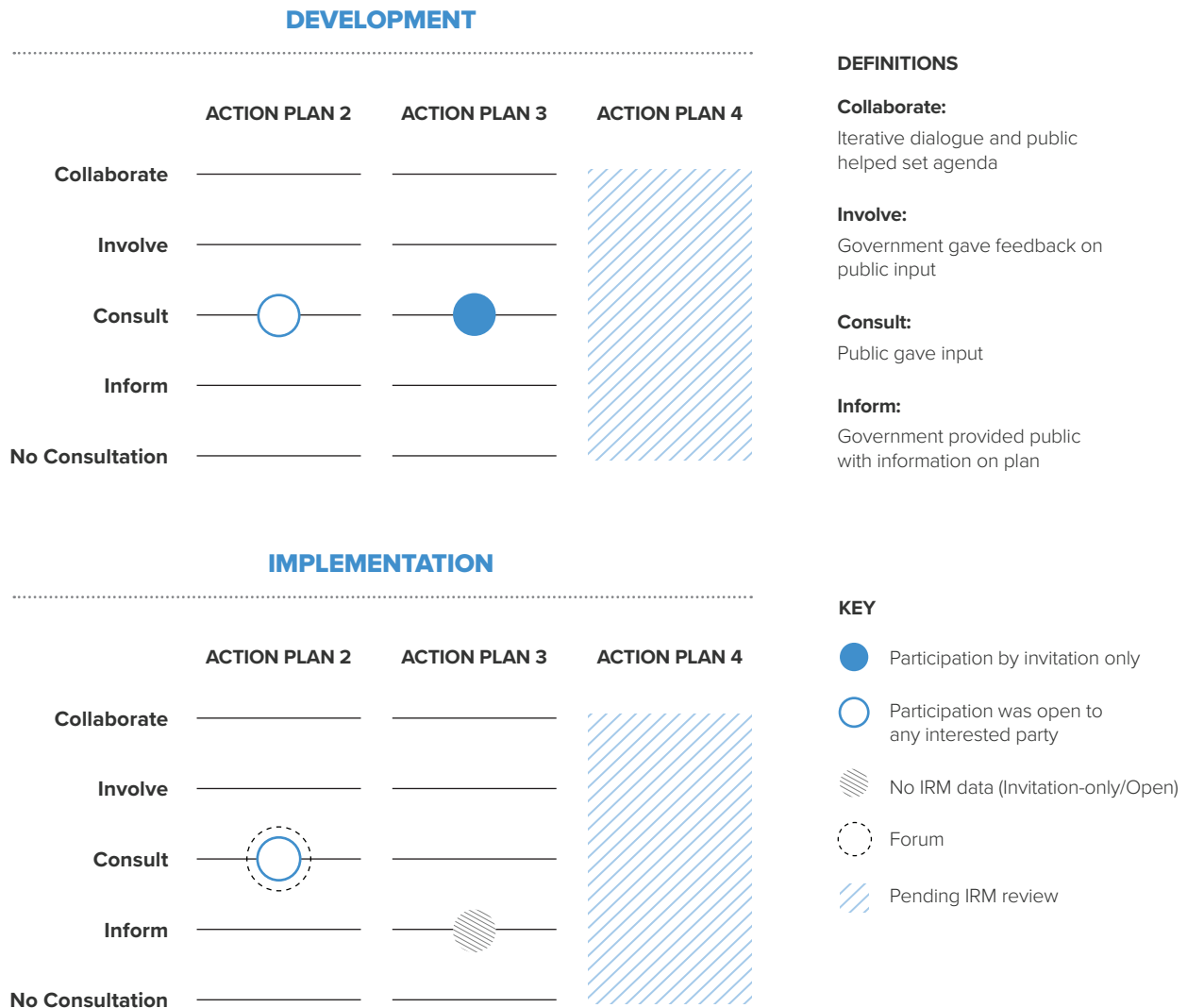

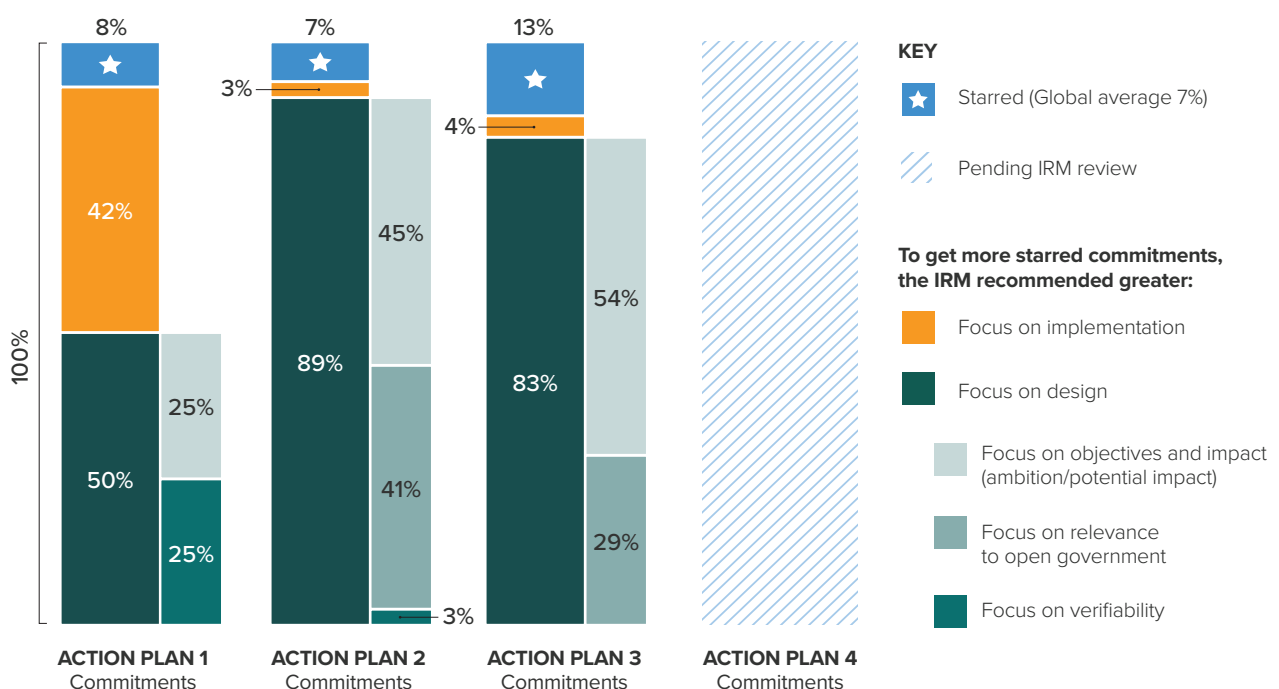

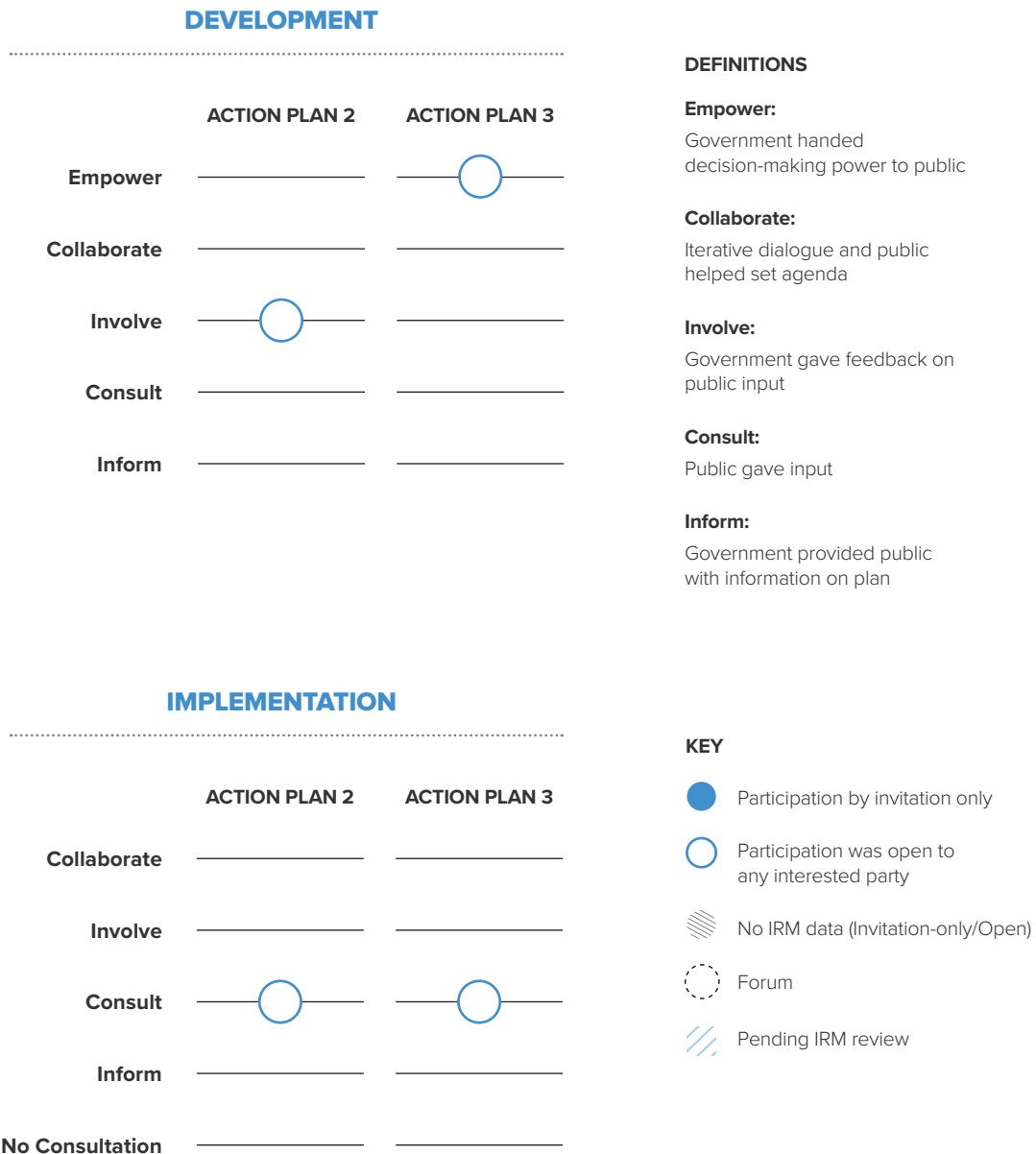

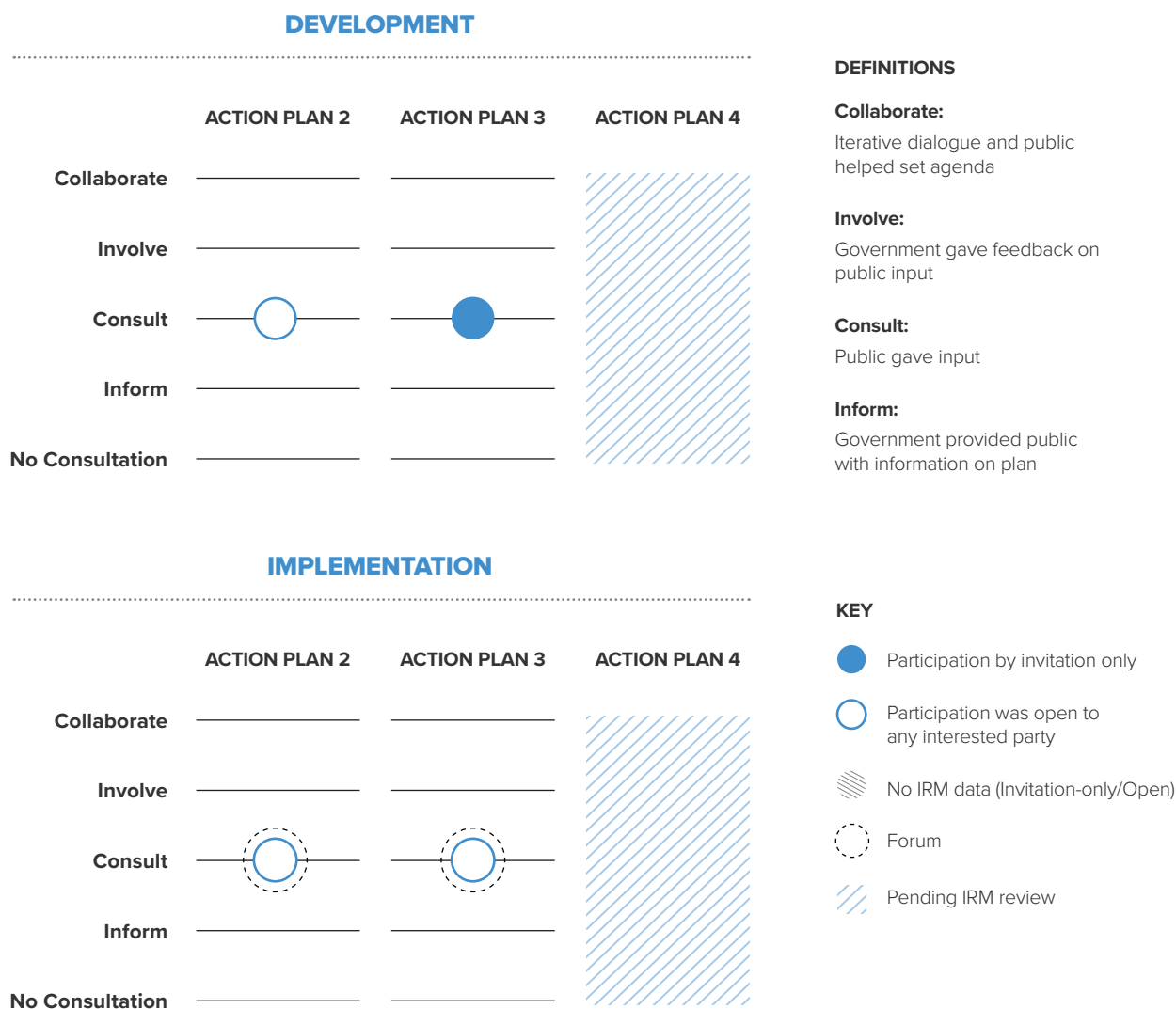

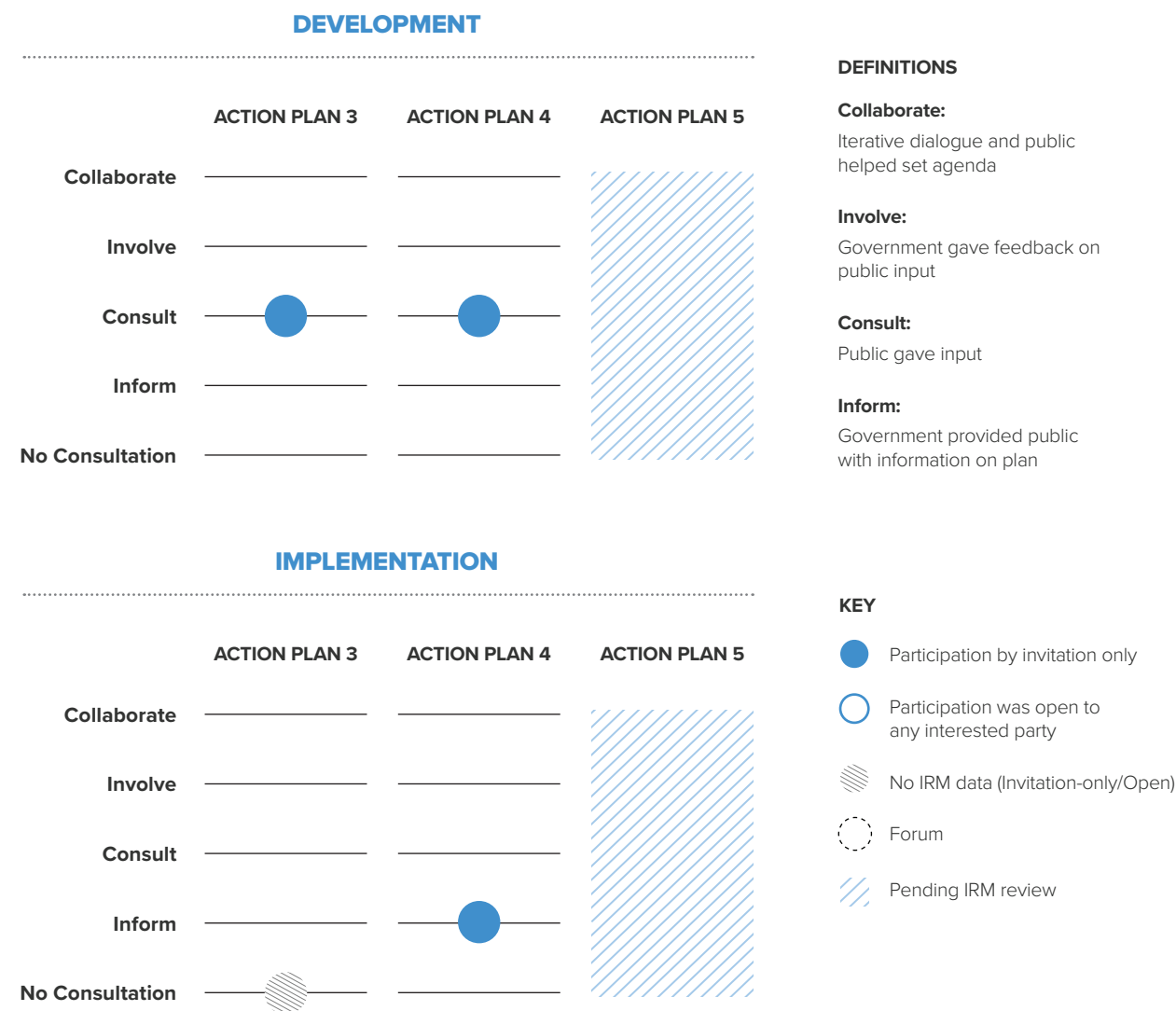

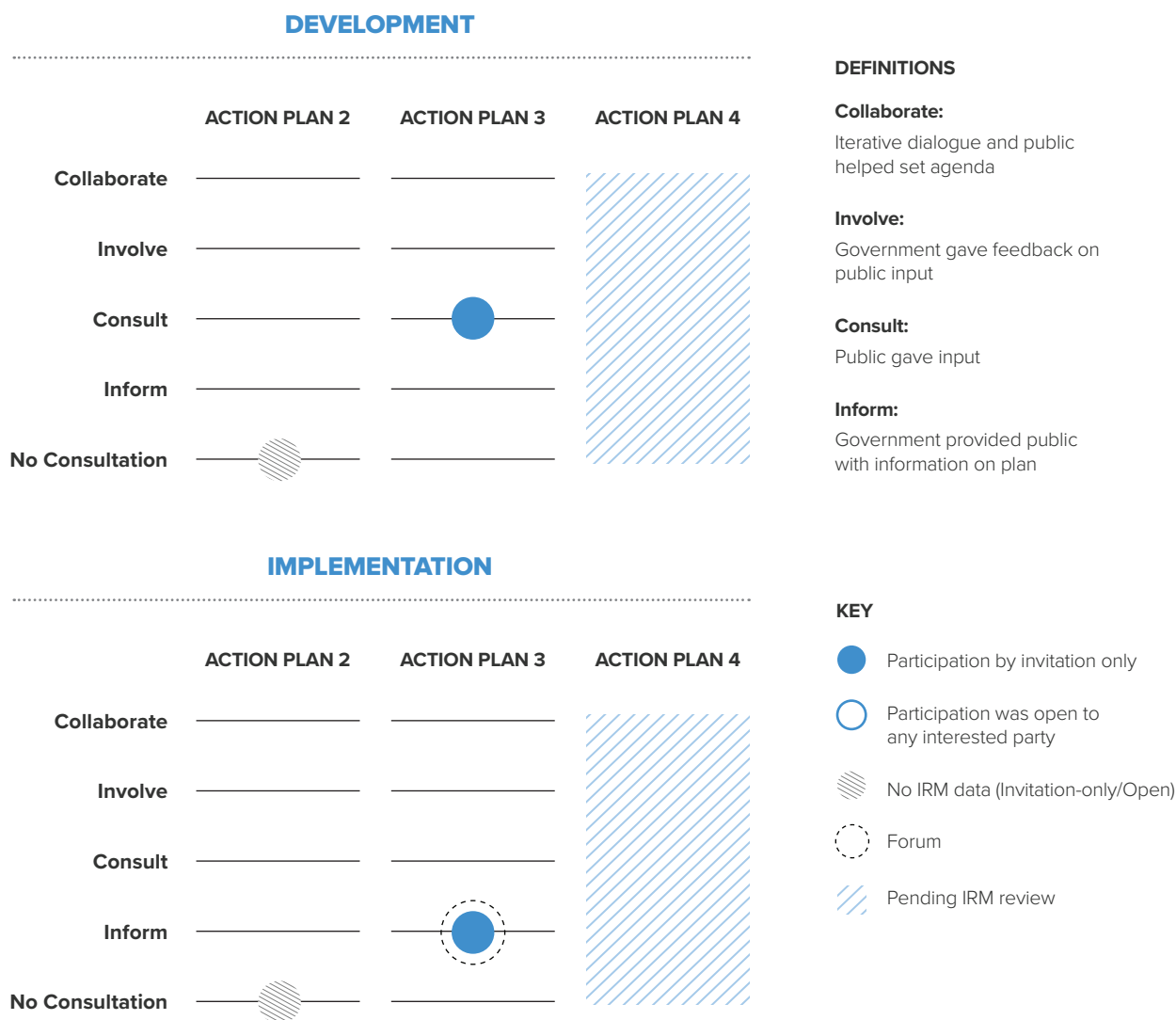

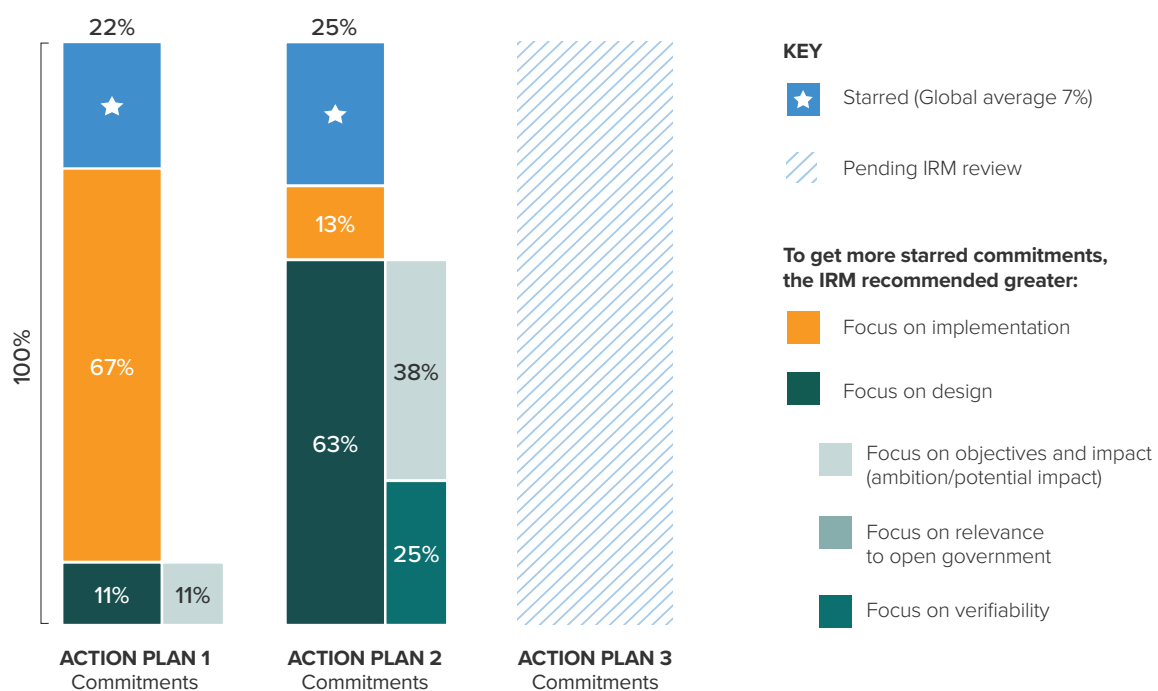

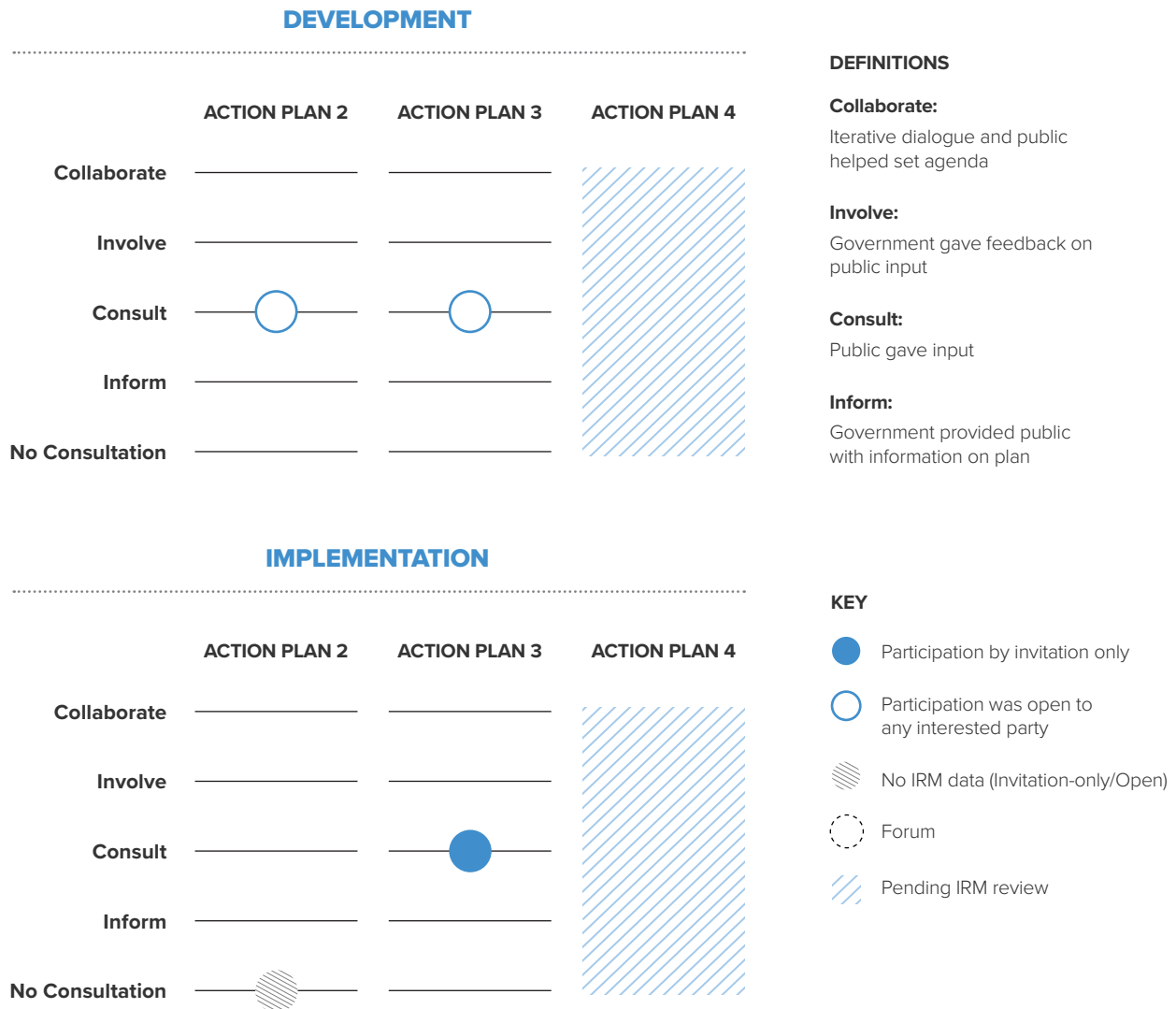

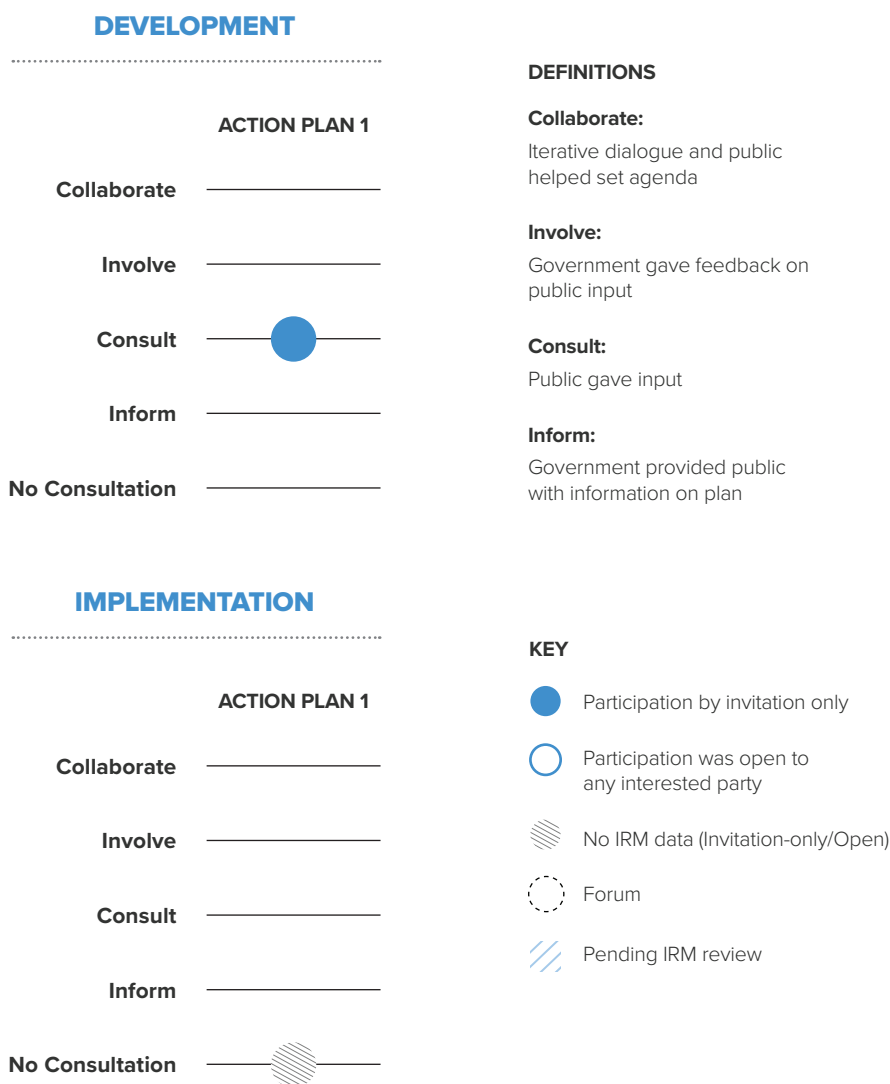

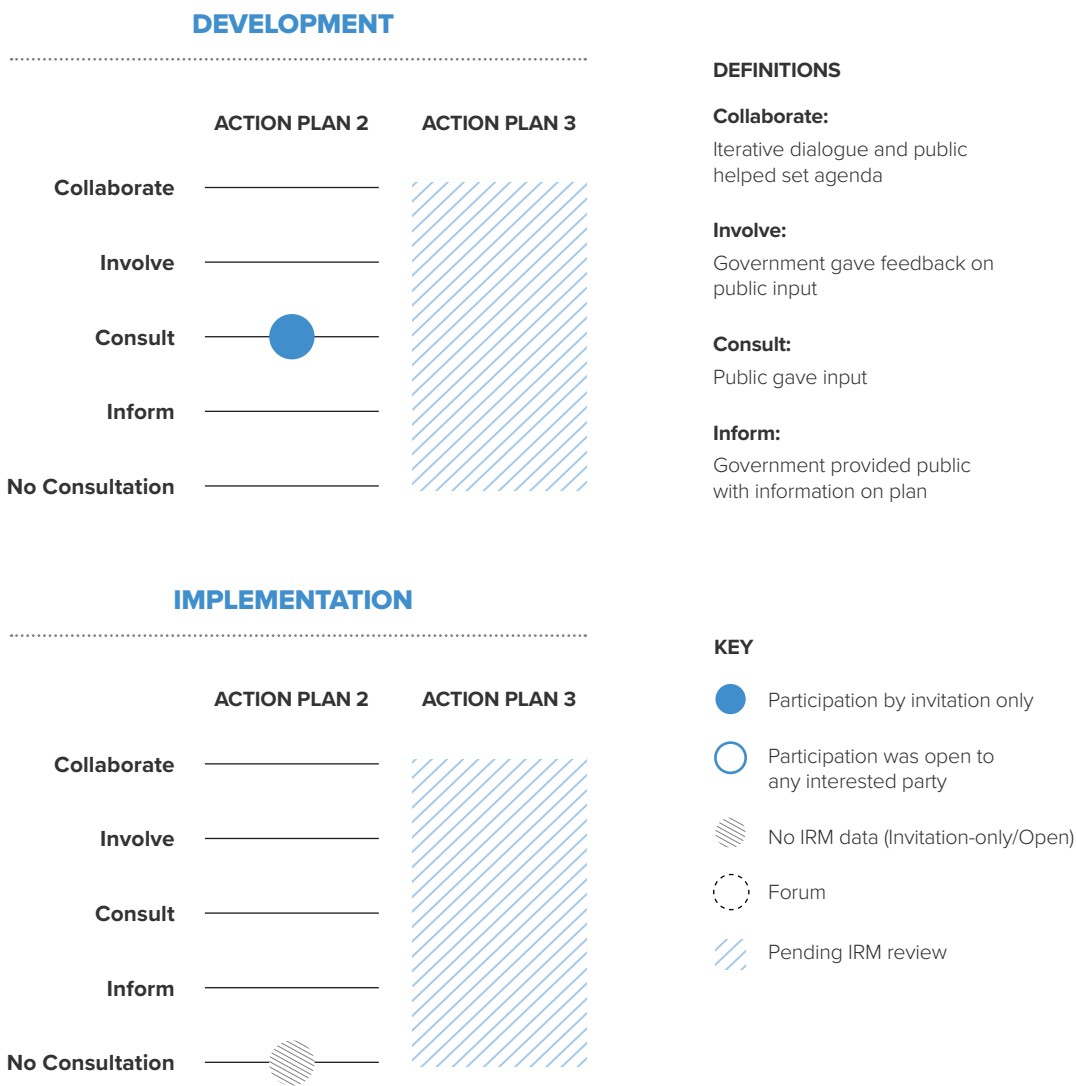

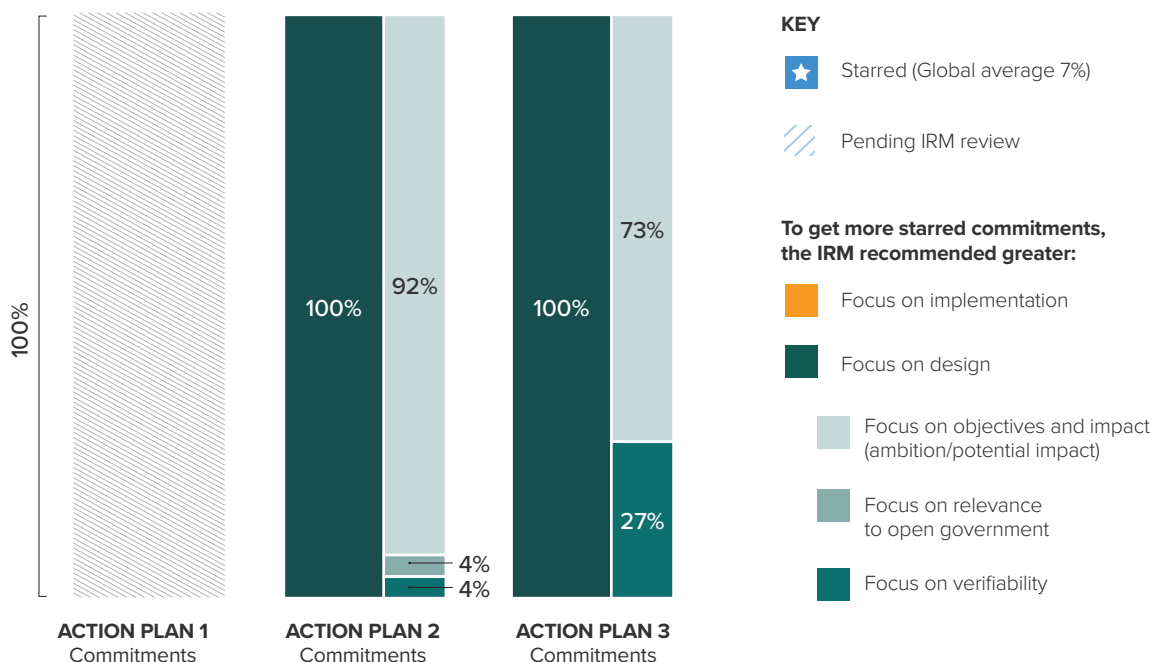

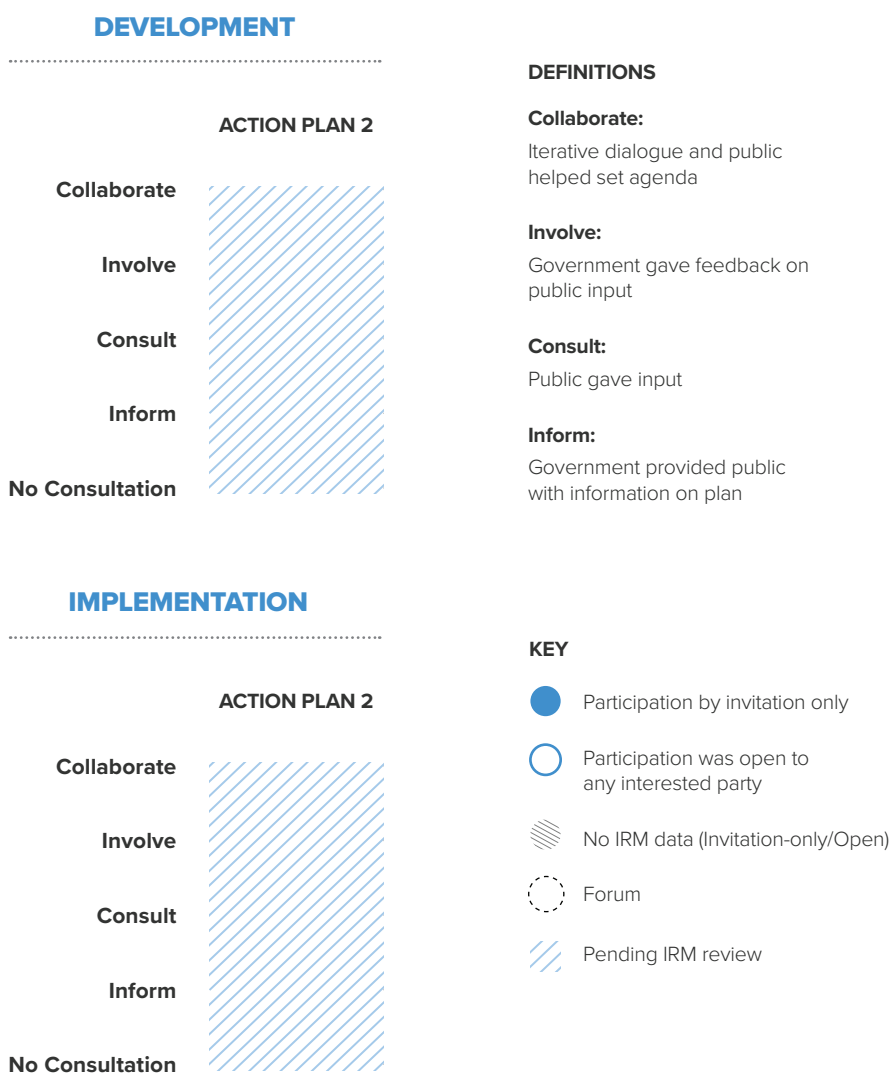

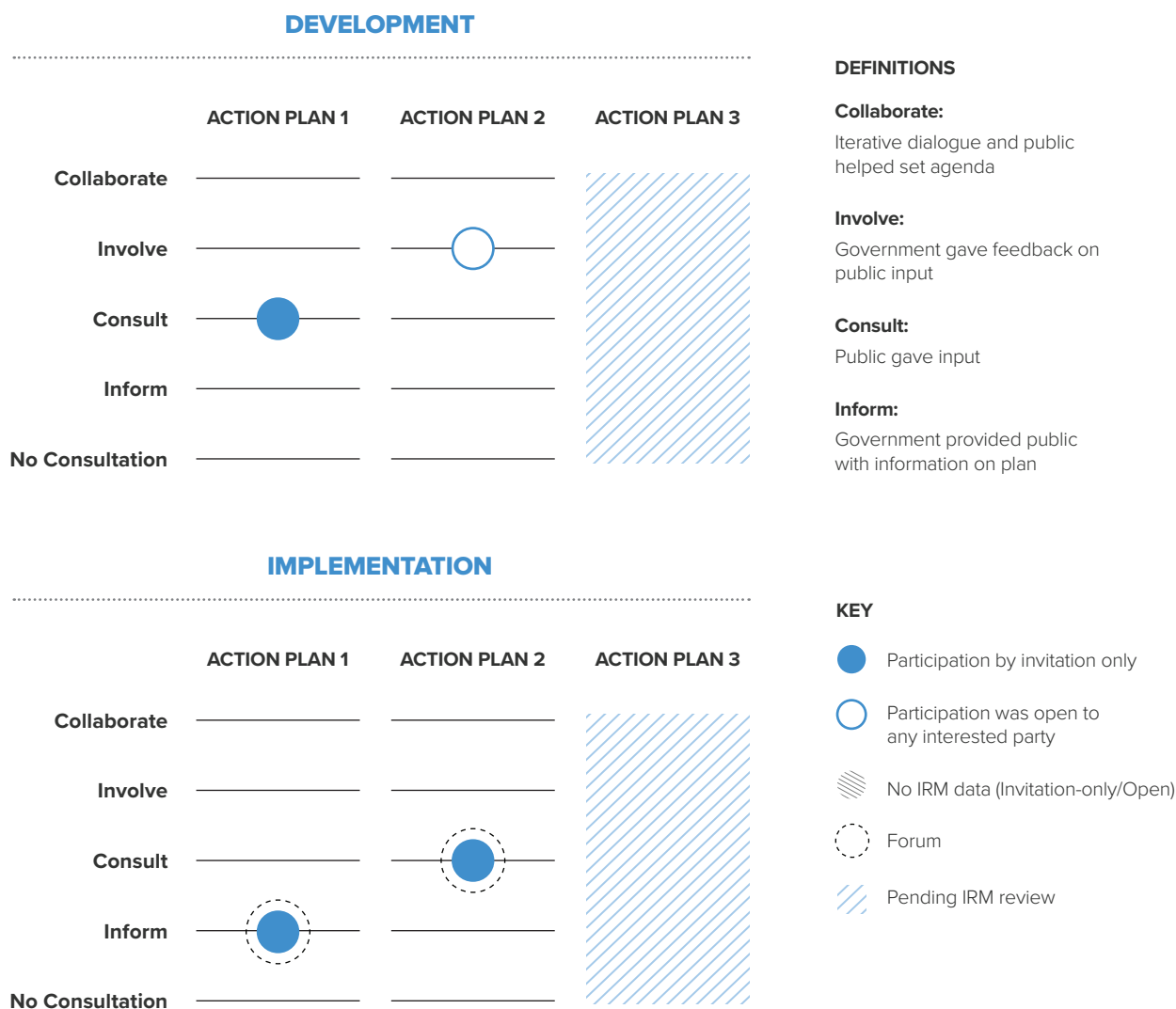

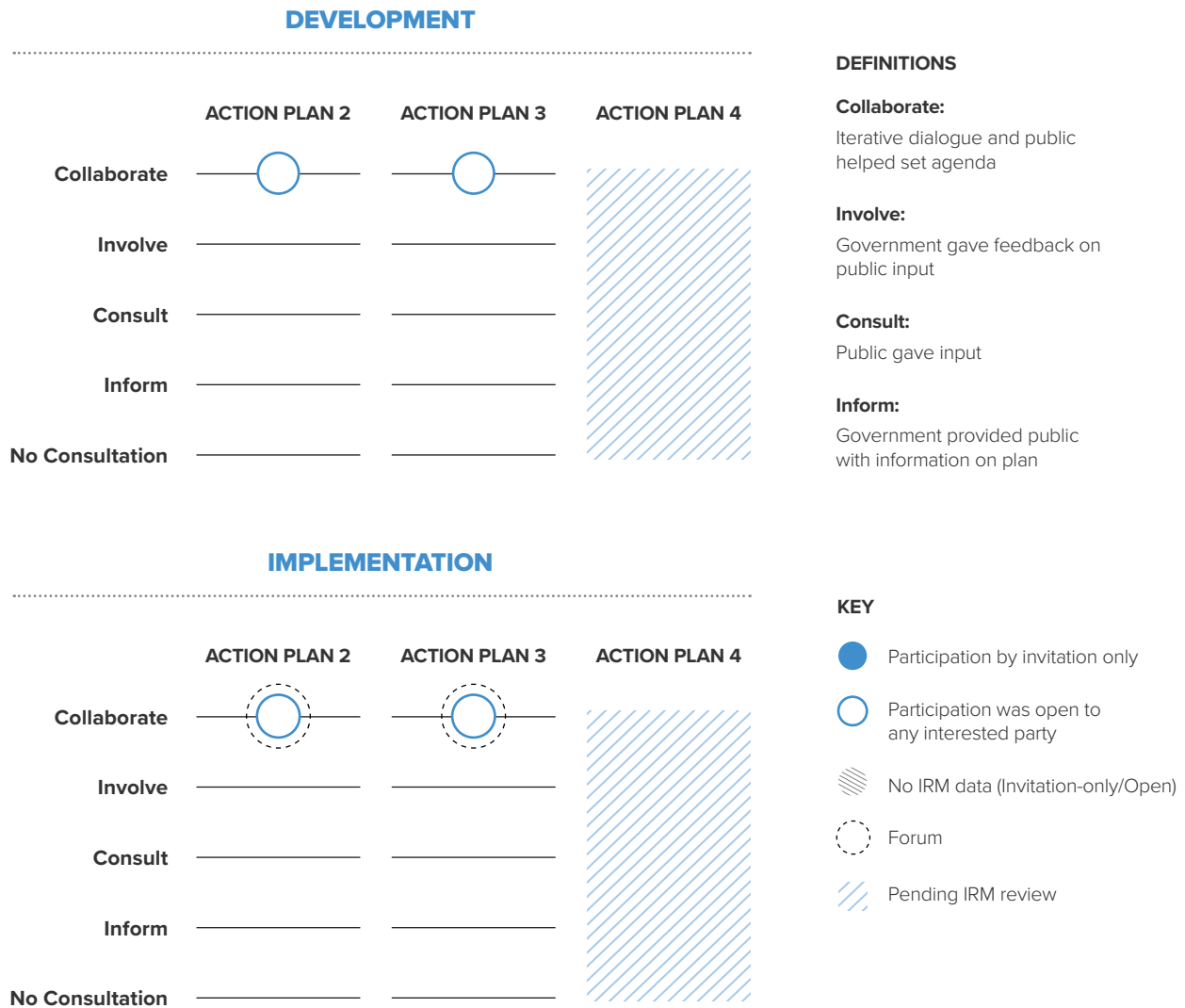

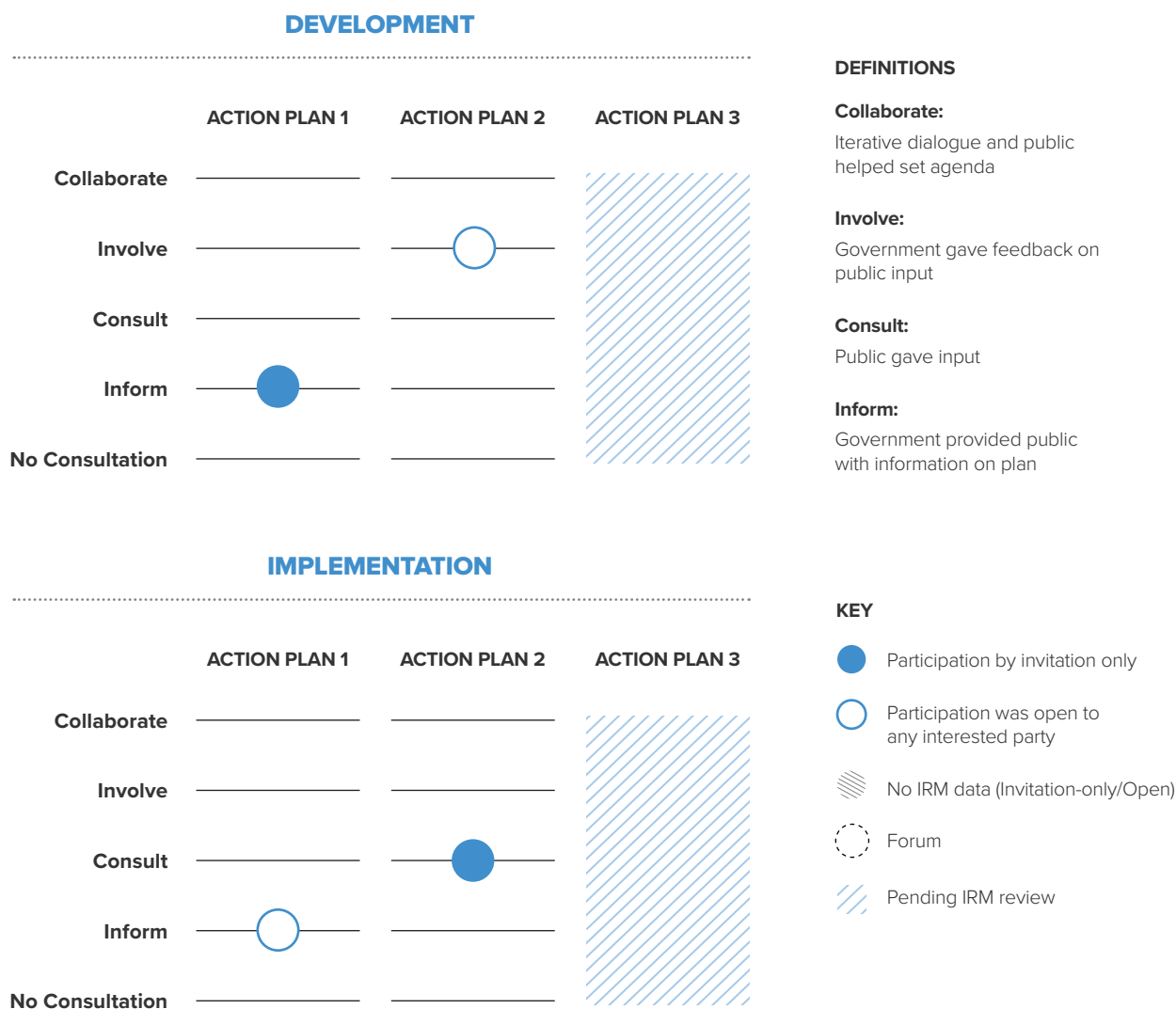

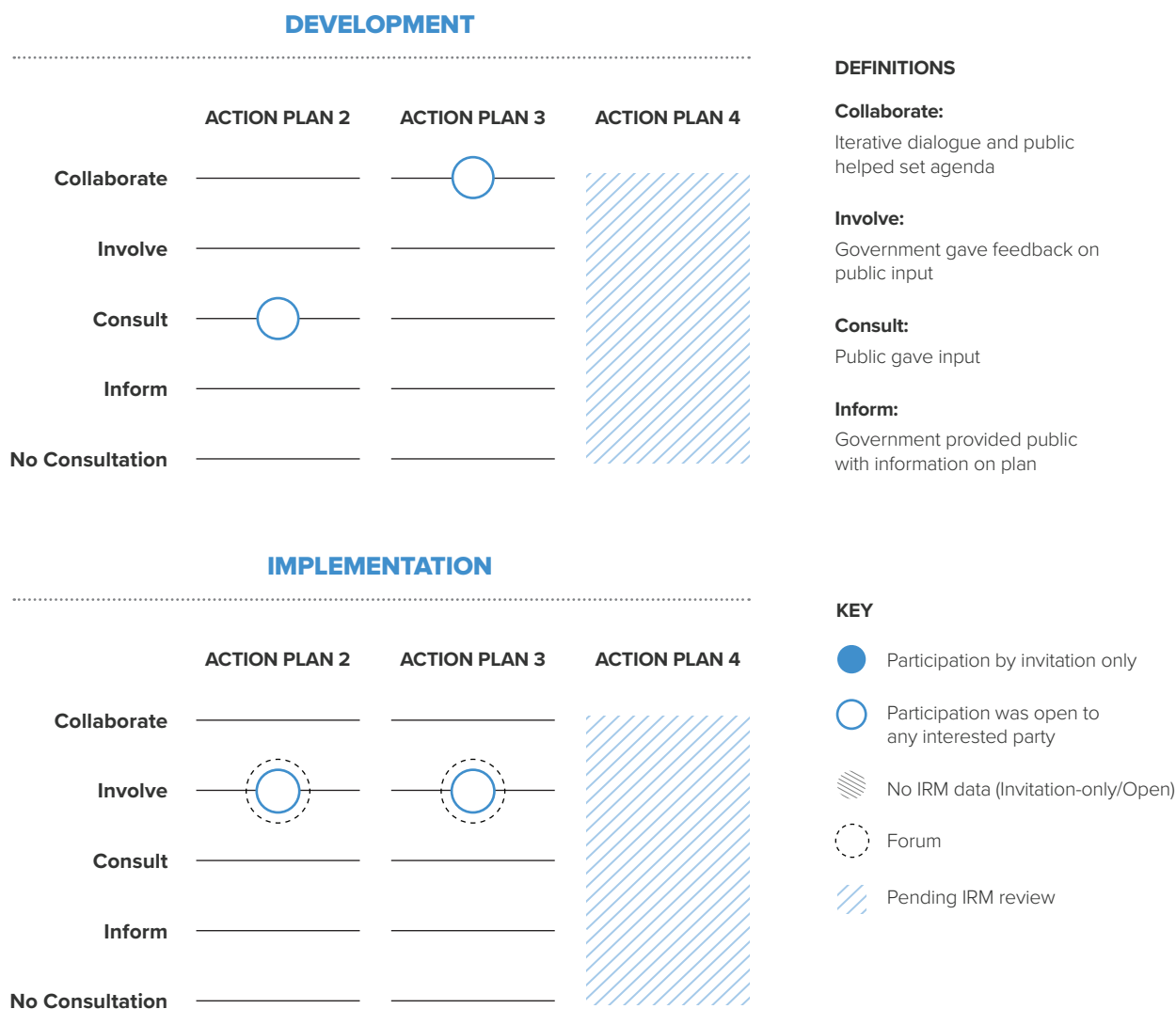

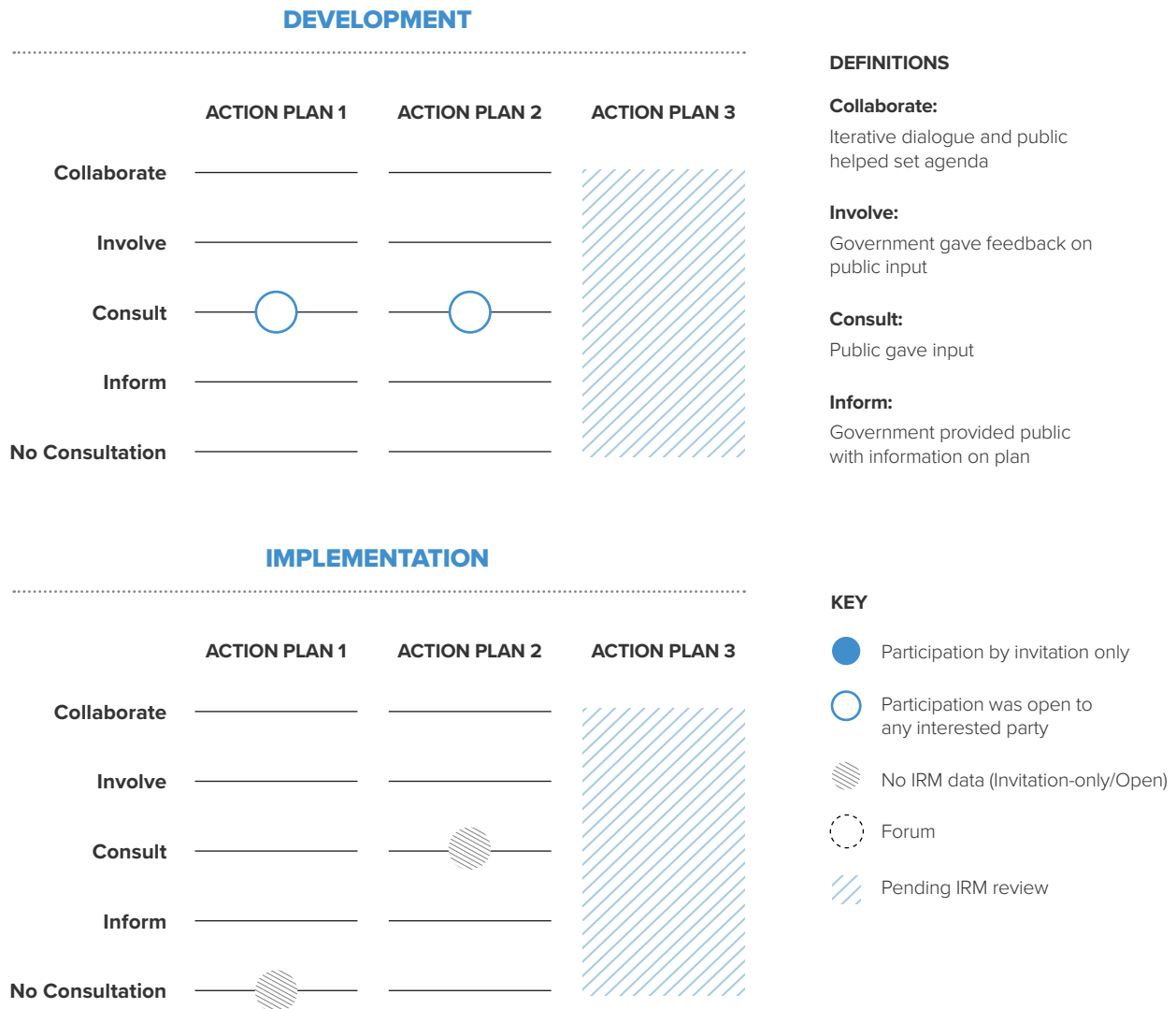

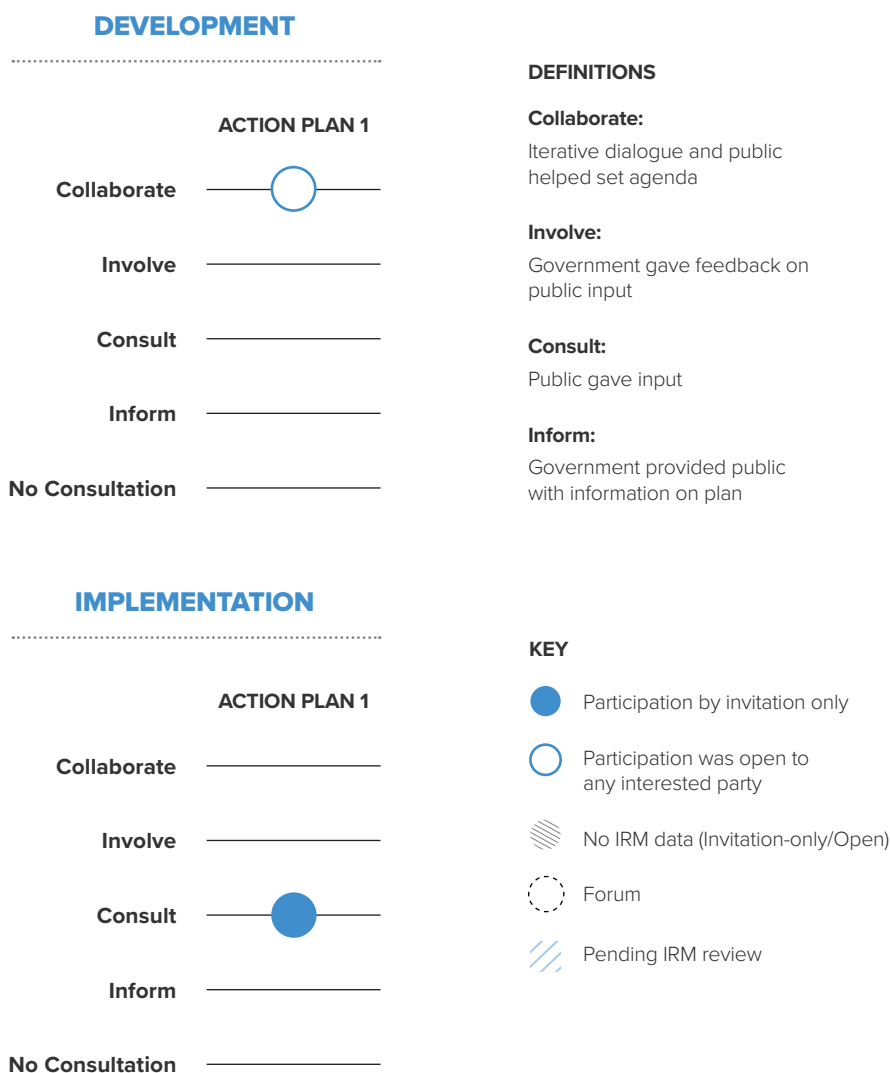

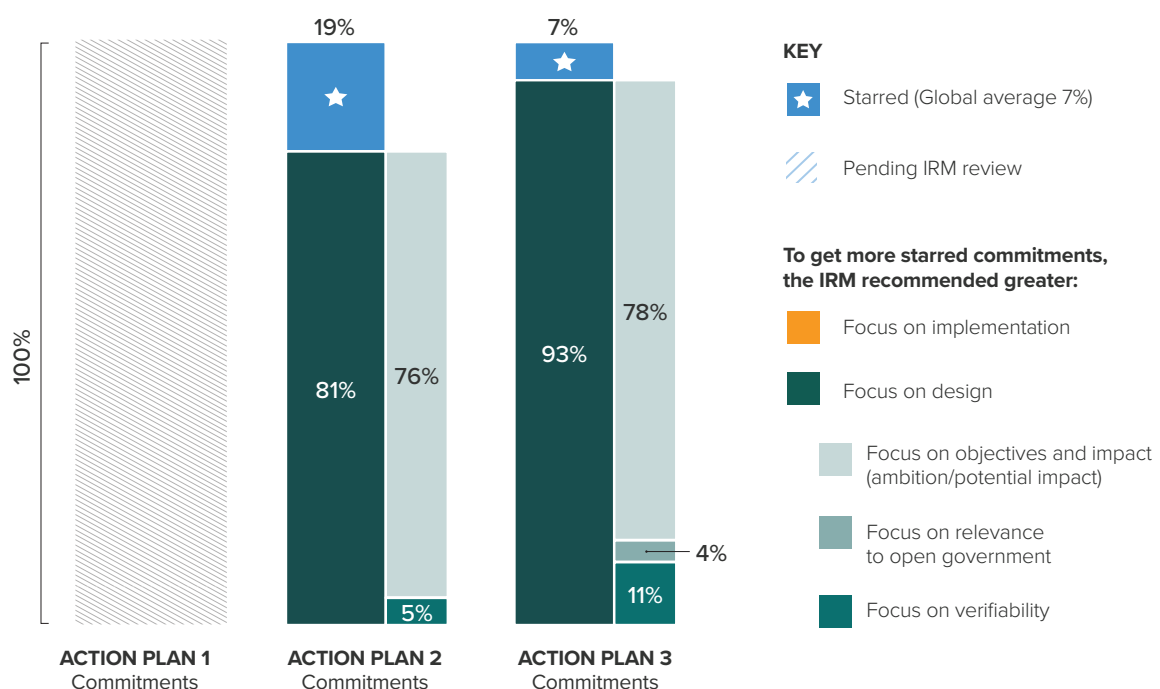

Local Members

The OGP Local Program aims to harness the innovation and momentum demonstrated by local governments and civil society partners across the world. OGP is a platform for these governments and civil society to come together to make their governments more open, inclusive, and responsive, modeling the values and principles of the Open Government Declaration.

Local governments are closer to the people and their work has a more direct impact on citizens' everyday lives than national-level governments. With increased populations in urban areas come increasing demands for services and the need for more effective and responsive local-level governments. However, it is not just city governments that are facing challenges that could benefit from OGP's support. States, regions, provinces, and counties deliver crucial services, especially within federalized systems, where healthcare and education are in many cases administered at the state and local county levels. These governments are often more nimble than national-level governments and are in closer proximity to the people they exist to serve. This makes the impact they can have by participating in OGP sizeable. They are also sometimes inadequately resourced and therefore have a greater need for support.

Improved visibility of the types of open government initiatives happening at all levels of government helps OGP to better serve not only local but also national-level governments, as many innovations and open government reforms are happening at the local level. The OGP Local Program helps to build partnerships between local governments and civil society organizations to make their governments more open, accountable, and responsive to citizens.

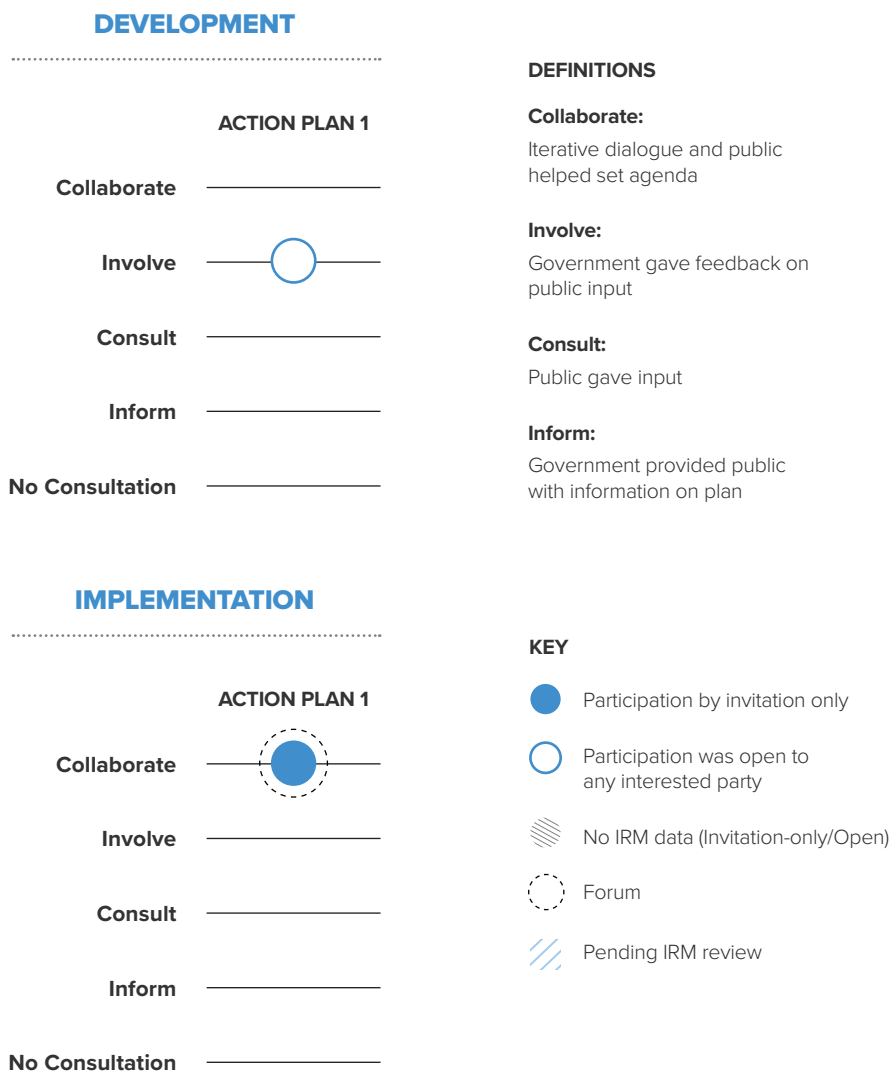

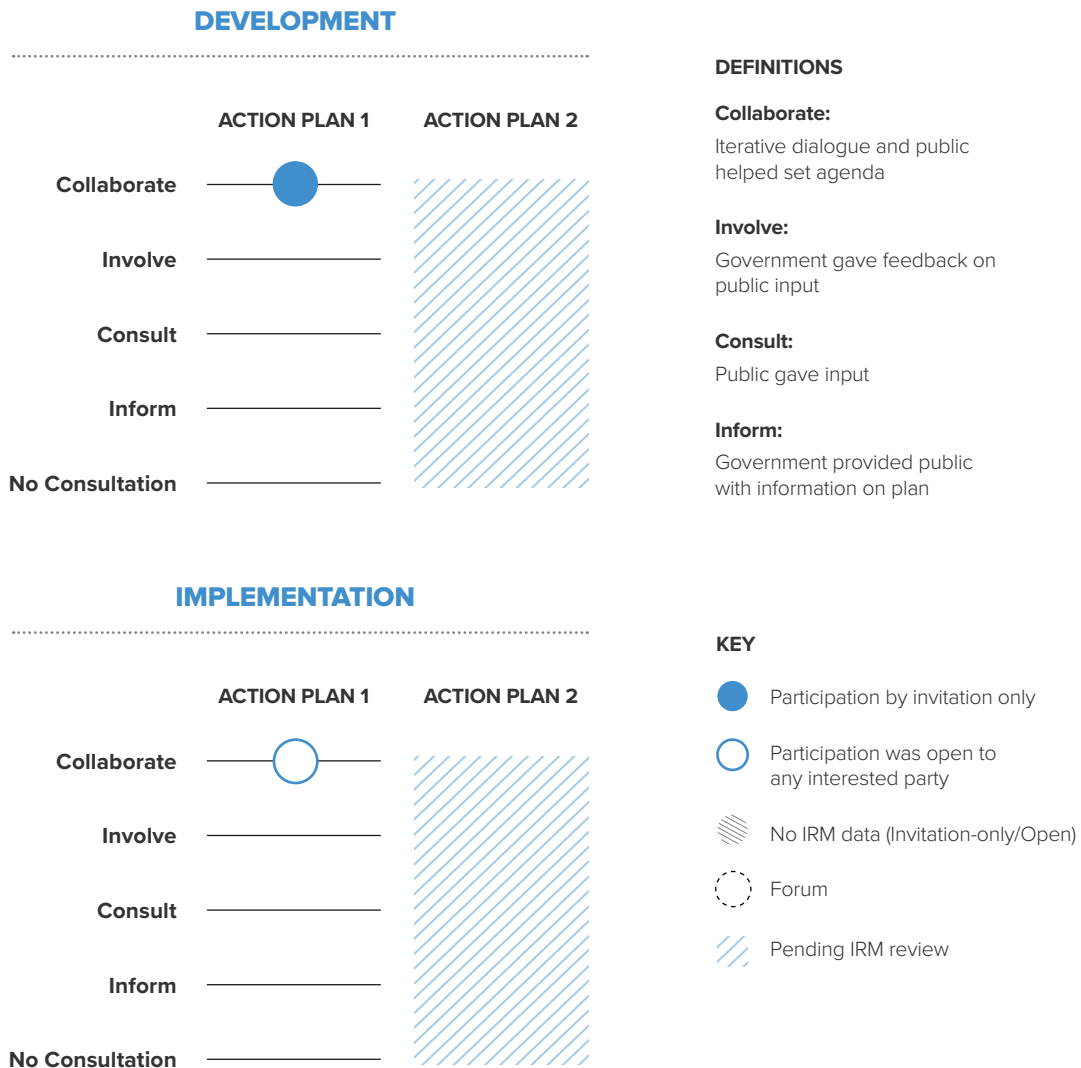

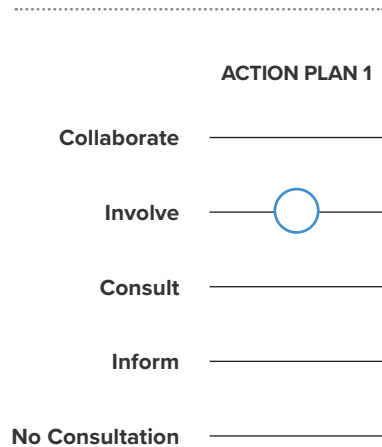

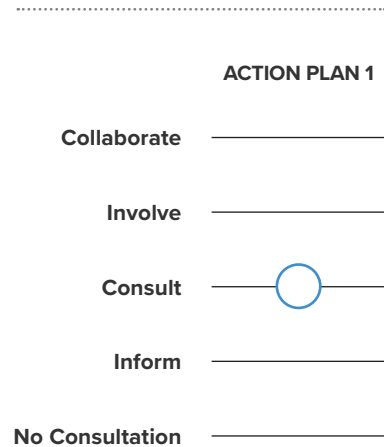

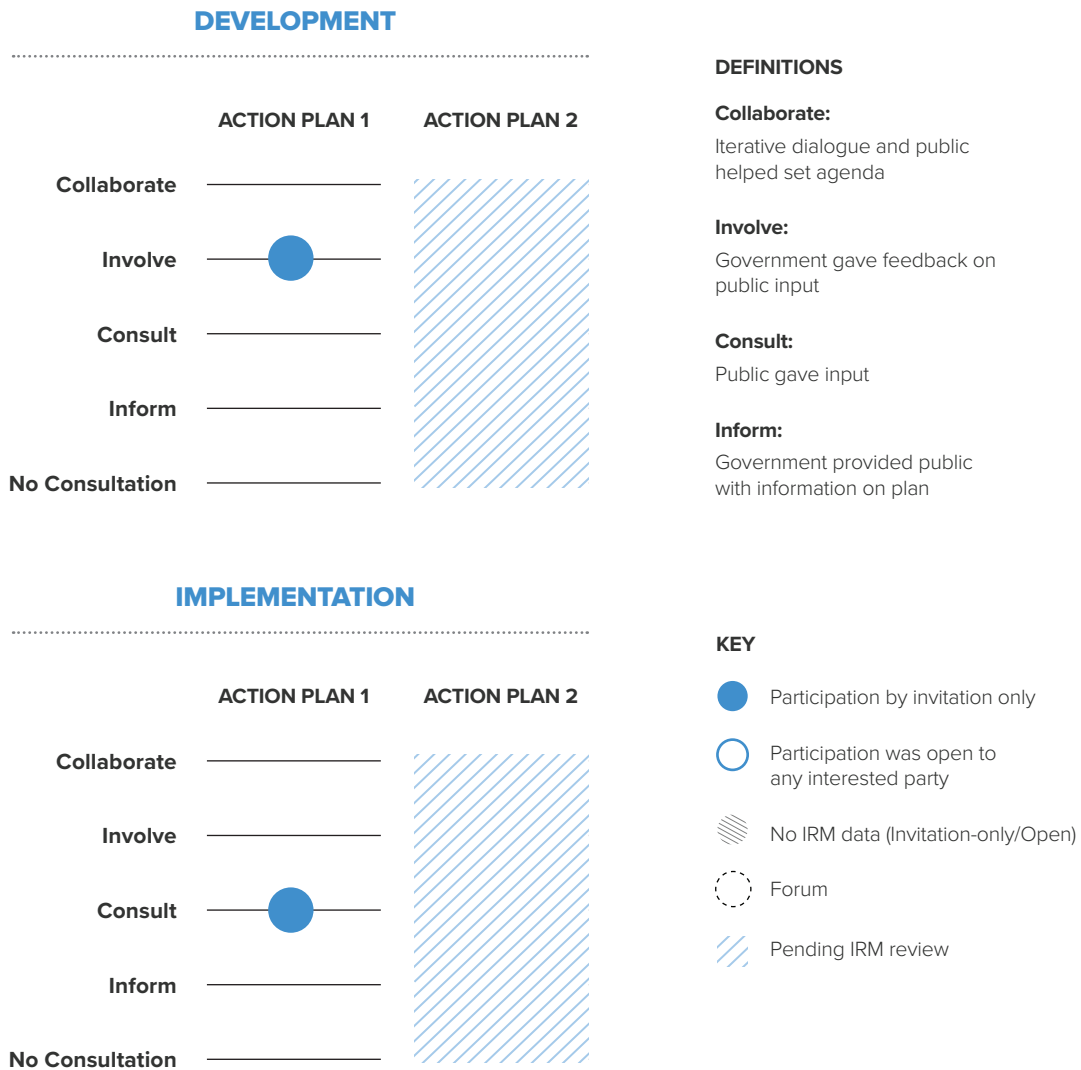

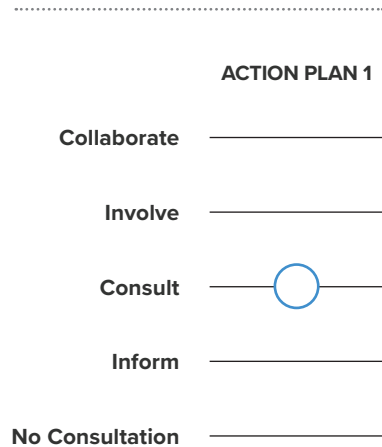

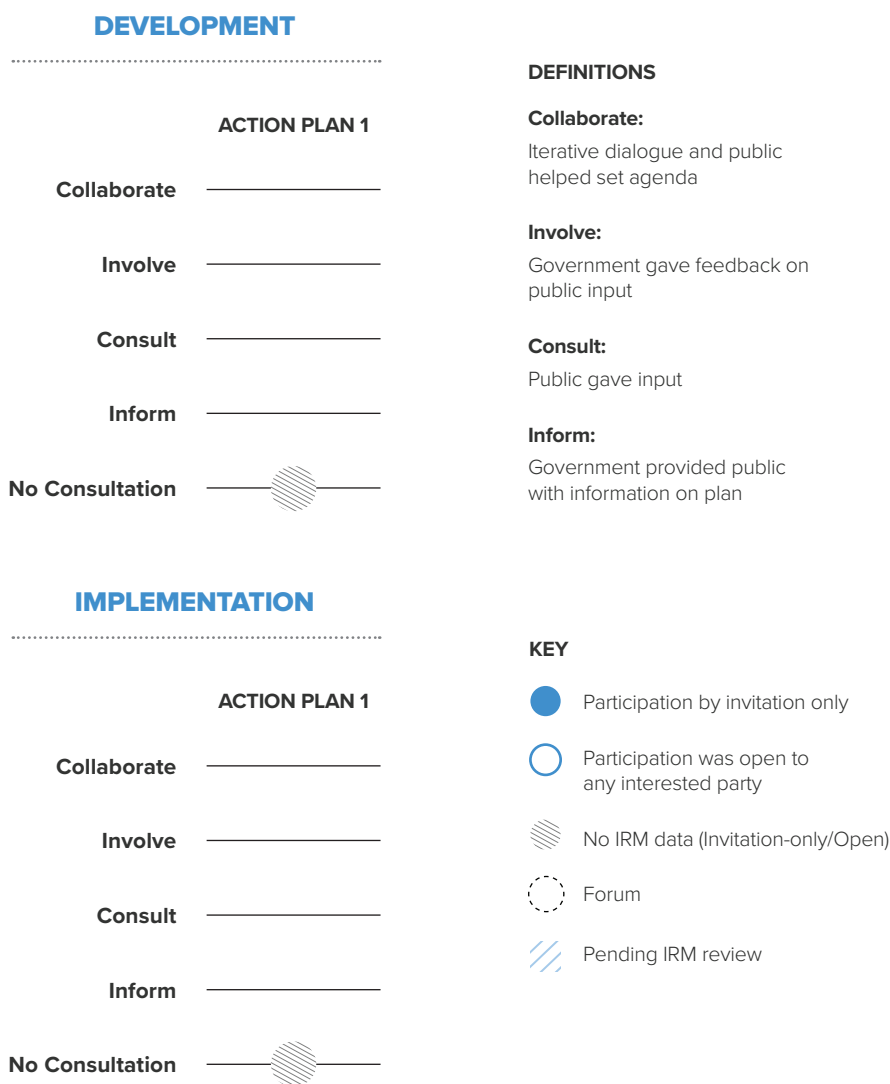

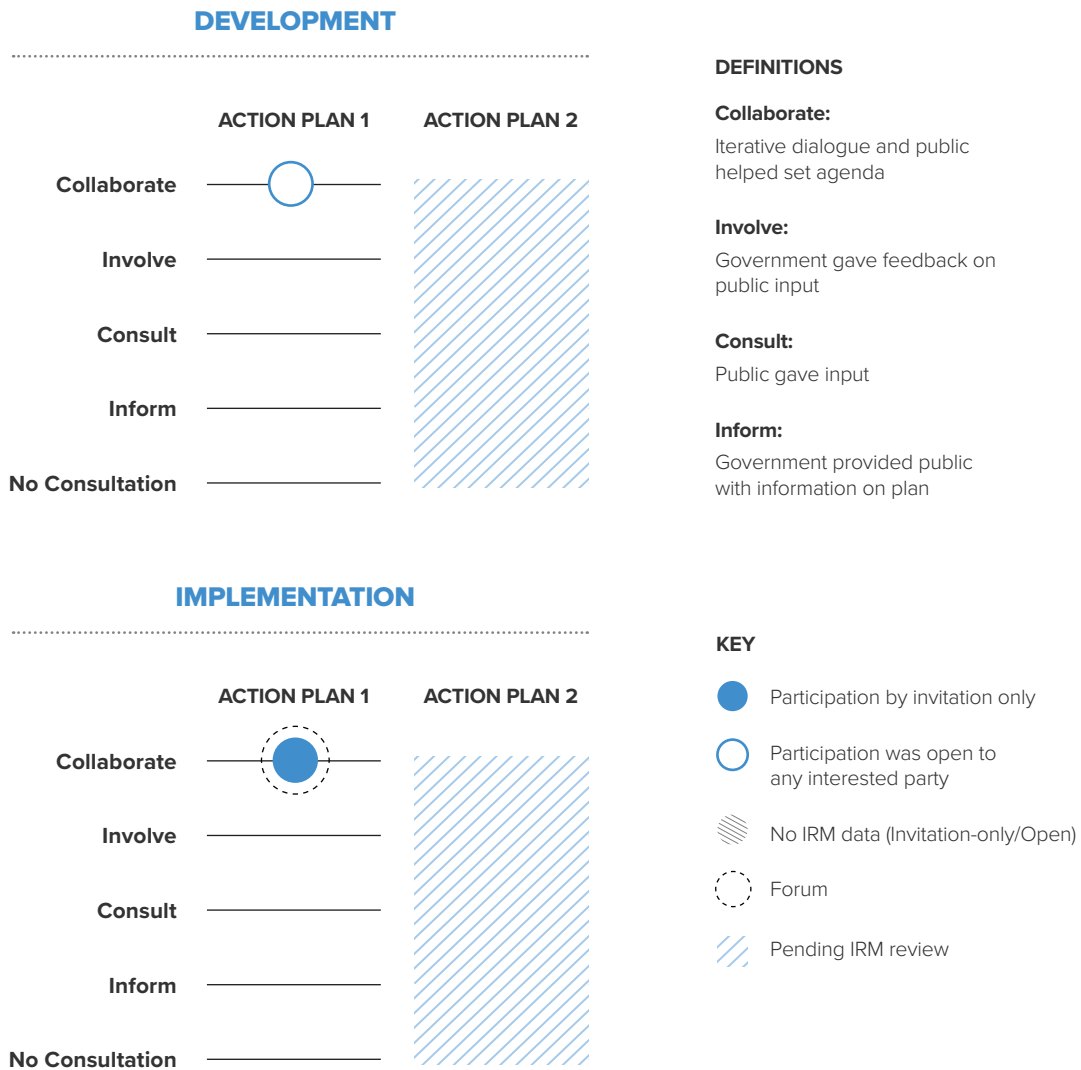

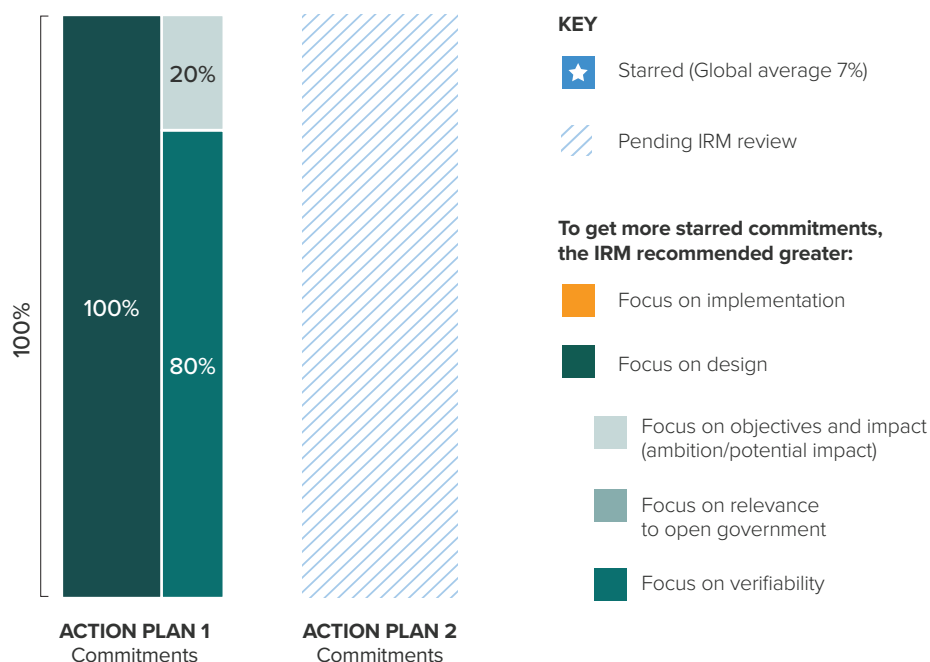

Report Goals and Approach

The OGP Global Report aims to synthesize data and findings from OGP and other leading organizations into a single publication with the goal of providing thought leadership to the Partnership, state-of-play analysis on selected dimensions of open government, and comparative snapshots on all OGP members. The specific goals of the report include:

- 1. Visibility:** Build global awareness of OGP values and the Partnership's role, as well as country performance, especially to high-level actors and politicians;
- 2. Close the gaps:** Create compelling incentives to close the ambition and implementation gaps at the national level;
- 3. Comparability:** Provide a means by which countries may compare themselves with one another and compare action plans over time;
- 4. Collective action:** Cultivate a sense of shared ownership and accountability for cross-cutting reforms in priority areas for all OGP countries;
- 5. Context and achievement:** Demonstrate and highlight many of the most relevant, ambitious, and high-impact commitments.

To achieve these goals, the report features three distinct—yet complementary—sections:

- 1. Collective results:** Discusses the global state of open government, including the current state of knowledge around issues of open government, and assesses the early results of OGP.
- 2. Priority areas for reform:** Presents the state of play, emerging practices, and next steps for using open government to strengthen civic space, anti-corruption efforts, and public services.
- 3. Member pages:** Provides a comparative snapshot of achievements, progress, and areas for improvement for all OGP members.

Together, the main sections of the report enable two key user pathways:

- 1. Inspiring reformers:** The Member Pages help local reformers identify open government achievements and challenges in their jurisdiction. After identifying areas for growth, reformers can then leverage the policy area sections, which provide examples of innovations from other countries—as well as emerging standards and maturity models—to develop ambitious commitments in key areas of open government.
- 2. Identifying key actors and reforms:** Conversely, the policy area sections help issue-specific organizations identify the OGP entities that are playing a leadership role in their field, as well as those that would benefit from new reforms. From there, the Member Pages enable these users to find specific actions that they can support or advocate for.

Each of these sections combines data from OGP's Independent Reporting Mechanism with data from other, third-party sources. This section describes the sources, standards, and choices made in using that data.

Scope of the Report

To maximize impact, this edition of the OGP Global Report focuses on only five dimensions of open government:

- 1. Anti-corruption**
 - a. Open contracting
 - b. Beneficial ownership
- 2. Civic space**
 - a. Freedom of association
 - b. Freedom of assembly
 - c. Defending journalists and activists (freedom of expression)
- 3. Access to information**
 - a. Reactive systems: Right to information regimes

b. Proactive release: Open data in core public services (water and sanitation, health, and education)

4. Open policy-making

- a. Participation in lawmaking
- b. Open rules and regulations

5. Fiscal openness

- a. Transparency of budget / fiscal information
- b. Participation in budget / fiscal policy
- c. Oversight of budget / fiscal policies

The five dimensions above are featured in the section called *Selected Dimensions of Open Government* in the Member Pages. Anti-corruption, civic space, and public services are additionally featured in the *Priority Areas for Reform* section.

Selecting the dimensions of open government

In an effort to have a fair and transparent method for arriving at the selected dimensions featured in the report, the OGP Global Report team applied four criteria:

- 1. Recurring:** The topics are referenced in core, publicly-endorsed OGP documents, including the Paris Declaration, Eligibility Requirements and Values Check, Open Government Declaration, and OGP Strategy.
- 2. Room for impact:** OGP can clearly make a difference as a platform or accelerant.
- 3. Data availability:** There is reliable, useful, and useable third-party data available for OGP countries.
- 4. Universal relevance:** The topic is relevant across the diverse membership of OGP.

The selected dimensions underwent review by OGP staff, funders, and OGP's senior management in 2018 before their inclusion in this report. They have three important characteristics:

- 1. Informative purpose:** In the spirit of OGP, the selected dimensions are not meant to prescribe action or communicate that entities are required to work in these areas.

2. Subject to change: The selected dimensions could change in the next edition of the report due to changes in data availability or shifting priorities.

3. Subset of OGP reforms: By design, the dimensions are not exhaustive or representative of the diverse set of reforms included in OGP action plans.

Process for Developing the Report

Mandate from the OGP Steering Committee

During its meeting in Washington, DC in June 2017, the OGP Steering Committee approved the development of a concept note for the report. Subsequently, during the Steering Committee meeting in New York in September 2017, OGP staff presented the concept note and the comparative elements. During the intervening months, the OGP Support Unit secured funding for the project, which officially began after the OGP Summit in Tbilisi, Georgia in July 2018.

Public and expert consultations

In September 2018, the OGP Global Report team held 12 public consultations on each of the sub-dimensions featured in the report. The consultations were promoted through social media, OGP email lists, and the OGP website. Invitations were also sent directly to government points of contact for OGP. As part of an "open door" policy, the team also spoke with civil society experts, government officials, donors, the OGP steering committee, and anyone who requested a meeting. In all, more than 100 people from civil society and government—working at both the local and national levels around the world—contributed comments. The feedback from the consultations was published on the Global Report page of the OGP website.

Review process

In addition to OGP staff members, external partners reviewed the report before its publication. In January 2019, government points of contact received a draft of their member page for commenting and fact-checking. In February 2019, several issue experts provided comments and feedback on the Priority Areas for Reform section. These experts are listed in the Acknowledgements section of the report. In



March 2019, the draft report was circulated among the members of the Governance & Leadership Sub-Committee of the OGP Steering Committee.

About the data in the report

This report features both OGP data (collected by OGP's Independent Reporting Mechanism, IRM) as well as data published by respected partner organizations. All data was drawn from pre-existing, publicly available sources. While the data was adapted for the purposes of this publication, OGP did not carry out any original data collection to produce this report. For more information about how the IRM conducts its reporting, see "Annex A: About the Independent Reporting Mechanism."

Data selection process

The OGP Global Report team created a census of all potential third-party data sources for each of the sub-dimensions featured in the report. Data advisors provided initial guidance during this process. These advisors are listed in the Acknowledgements section of the report.

Data priorities

The OGP Global Report team used a list of defined criteria to select the datasets that are featured in the report. While it was not possible to use only datasets that met all of the criteria, the team selected datasets that met as many of the following priorities as possible:

- 1. Relevance:** Accurately describes performance in the policy area, or at least serves as an effective proxy.
- 2. Coverage:** Covers most OGP countries, or at least covers a representative subset of UN-recognized countries.
- 3. Recency:** Published in 2018, and data was collected as close to then as possible.
- 4. Reliability:** Uses a clear method, which includes surveys, expert coders, or a review of primary sources. Codings are justified or otherwise explained.
- 5. Transparency:** Links to primary source documents and underlying data that explain the top-level scores.
- 6. Future editions:** Strong signals that data will be updated in the future.

7. Actionability: Is easily interpretable and has concrete policy implications.

Data gaps

The OGP Global Report team identified existing data gaps for several of the selected dimensions of open government. Although proxies were used to address these gaps in the report, the gaps are listed below, both to acknowledge the limitations of the existing data and to signal to partners and funders that datasets in these policy areas would enable more accurate assessments of real-world performance:

Beneficial ownership: The Financial Secrecy Index used in this report is an excellent resource for assessing progress on beneficial ownership transparency reforms, but there is limited coverage of OGP countries. Other global datasets that track beneficial ownership transparency are not as rigorous or do not set as high a standard for openness in this field.

Open policy-making: Although open policy-making is one of the five dimensions of open government selected for this report, there is a lack of global data on legislative aspects of this topic, particularly as it relates to lobbying, ethics, and participation in lawmaking. Although various regional datasets exist, they have not yet reached scale. This report uses datasets that measure the quality of general consultations as proxies.

Right to information (RTI): The Right to Information Rating is an excellent source of information on the quality of legal RTI regimes. However, there is a lack of global data on the functioning of right to information regimes, including metadata such as the number of requests by agency, appeals, and reasons for refusal. This report uses expert survey data as a proxy for the operation of RTI systems.

Public services: There is a general lack of systematized data on the actual governance of public services, including levels of public participation in governance mechanisms. For this reason, this report focuses only on open data related to public services, which cannot serve as a proxy for the quality of governance.

Gender disaggregation: With a few notable exceptions (V-Dem, GLAAS, and ODIN, see below),

very little of the data provides gender-specific indicators, gender-disaggregated averages or, where appropriate, meta-data on the collection of gender-disaggregated statistics. This limits the ability to detect gender differentiations and effects of open government reforms.

Time Lag

The data series that feeds this report is limited in time. This is because the world of governance data is constantly evolving. The IRM, in addition, releases dozens of reports annually. As a consequence, this report only covers data released up to 31 December 2018. This date was chosen as it was the final date for all new action plans in 2018. Digital versions of this report and member pages will be available online and

About the Member Pages

The member pages are meant to provide readers with a comparative snapshot of achievements, progress, and areas for improvement for all OGP members. The pages display data from OGP's Independent Reporting Mechanism (IRM), as well as from respected partner organizations. There are four main sections for each member page, each described in the sections that follow:

1. Key policy areas and highlights
2. OGP process information
3. Action plan performance
4. Selected dimensions of open government

Key policy areas and highlights

The goal of this section is to give readers an idea of the local “flavor” of each member’s participation in OGP. A core aspect of the Partnership involves supporting national priorities. For that reason, the first and most prominent section of the member page displays policy areas and commitments from each member’s recent OGP action plans.

Key policy areas

The *Key Policy Areas* were drafted by the OGP Global Report team. The staff selected topics that distinguish OGP members from their peers, in terms of the number of commitments made in the area. Government points of contact were able to suggest changes to the key policy areas, all of which are drawn from the most recent OGP action plan.

Highlighted commitments

The OGP Global Report team applied a consistent algorithm to prioritize three commitments for each OGP member. The algorithm prioritized commitments that received high marks according to the IRM starred commitment formula (see *Box 2. What is a starred commitment* for more details) and the “Did it open government?” (DIOG) variable. Specifically, commitments that were starred *and/or* received a coding of “major” or “outstanding” on the DIOG variable were labeled as an “Achievement.” Starred commitments received a star icon, and commitments coded as “major” / “outstanding” on the DIOG variable

GOOD TO KNOW

How data is used in this report

This report’s data model is featured in the Selected Dimensions of Open Government section of the Member Pages, which combines OGP data and third-party data to show how performance in OGP compares with real-world performance in selected areas of open government. For a full discussion of the method for that section, see the About the Member Pages section above.

The data model that feeds into the Selected Dimensions of Open Government section is additionally referenced in the Priority Areas for Reform section of the report, which also includes other datasets that were not included in the data model due to low coverage of OGP countries. For a full list and descriptions of all datasets used in this report, see Annexes B and C.



GOOD TO KNOW

What is a starred commitment?

Starred commitments are considered exemplary OGP commitments. To receive a star, a commitment must meet several criteria:

1. Specificity: The commitment text is specific enough that the IRM can judge its potential impact. Starred commitments have “medium” or “high” specificity.

2. Relevance: The commitment text makes clear its relevance to opening government. Specifically, the commitment must relate to at least one of the OGP values of access to information, civic participation, or public accountability.

3. Ambition: The commitment would have a “transformative” potential impact if completely implemented. The IRM assesses potential impact by identifying the policy problem, establishing the status quo at the outset of the action plan, and determining the degree to which the commitment would address the problem, if implemented.

4. Implementation: The government makes significant progress in implementing the commitment during the action plan period. Specifically, the commitment receives a completion score of “substantial” or “complete.”

The IRM has employed the formula above since 2015. For this reason, the number of starred commitments shown in IRM reports published before 2015 may differ from the number shown in this report.

were indicated as “major results” / “outstanding results.”

If an OGP member did not have three commitments in the most recent action plan that fit the definition for an “Achievement,” commitments from the previous action plan were considered (only going back to 2014–2016, to ensure that highlights are still relevant). If this did not yield any results, relevant commitments with the highest levels of potential impact (according to the IRM) from the most recent action plan were selected and designated as “Reforms to Watch.” Government points of contact were able to suggest highlighting other commitments than those selected by the algorithm. However, governments were not able to suggest changes to the language or to the labels, which are based on the IRM report findings.

OGP process information

Governments participating in OGP must meet a set of requirements for consultation during the development, implementation, and review of their action plan. Although the IRM evaluates many different aspects of the OGP process in each jurisdiction, this report focuses on three key indicators that have remained largely consistent over the years:

1. Level of public influence

2. Existence of a regular forum

3. Open vs. invitation-only consultations

The data for these indicators comes directly from IRM reports. Given changes to the IRM methodology and to the set of requirements for OGP members, this report does not display process data for action plans submitted in 2012 or earlier.

Level of public influence

This variable captures the level of influence that the public enjoyed during both the development and implementation of OGP action plans. The possible values are adapted from the International Association for Public Participation (IAP2) Spectrum of Participation. In the spirit of OGP, most members should aspire for “collaborate.” The range of possible values is below:

Collaborate: There was iterative dialogue AND the public helped set the agenda.

Involve: The government gave feedback on how public inputs were considered.

Consult: The public could give inputs.

Inform: The government provided the public with information on the action plan.

No consultation: There was no consultation.

The IRM assesses the level of public influence during the implementation of the action plan twice: in the midterm report (covers the first year of the action plan) and in the end-of-term report (covers the second year of the action plan). For OGP members that received an IRM end-of-term report, the level of public influence shown in this report matches the coding in the end-of-term report.

Existence of a regular forum

As part of their participation in OGP, governments commit to identify a forum to enable regular multistakeholder consultation on the implementation of OGP action plans. This forum can be an existing entity or a new one. This variable is binary (yes/no). In recent IRM reports, the IRM assesses two separate questions: Did a forum exist? and Did it meet regularly? To qualify as a regular forum in this report, the answer to both questions must be “yes.” Just like with the level of public influence variable above, this report displays the value from the IRM end-of-term report, if it is available.

Open vs. invitation-only consultations

Governments are expected to consult widely with their constituents and seek out a diverse range of views. This binary variable (open vs. invitation-only) shows whether opportunities to participate in consultations during the implementation of the action plan were limited to organizations specifically invited to do so, or whether this participation was open to any interested individual. Due to changes in methodology, some IRM reports do not code this value directly in the report. In these cases, OGP staff coded the value based on the text of the IRM midterm report. (If the consultations were by invitation-only at the midterm and there was an IRM end-of-term report available, OGP staff used the end-of-term report). If it is unclear from the IRM report whether consultations were open or invitation-only, this report indicates that the data was not collected by the IRM.

Action plan performance

This section provides a statistical and comparative snapshot of each OGP member’s achievements in OGP and reveals how each member can obtain further achievements. All data comes directly from published IRM reports.

Commitment performance

This section features three key IRM indicators of performance:

1. Starred commitments: See the box on the previous page for the definition.

2. Major results: According to the IRM, these commitments achieved a major step forward for government openness in the relevant policy area but remain limited in scope or scale. (Coded as “major” on the IRM’s “Did it open government?” variable.)

3. Outstanding results: According to the IRM, these commitments transformed business-as-usual in the relevant policy area through greater government openness. (Coded as “outstanding” on the IRM’s “Did it open government?” variable.)

The IRM did not assess all OGP commitments on the three indicators above due to changes in methods. For example, the IRM did not assess the potential impact of commitments in the first action plans of the eight founding OGP countries. As a result, there is no data on starred commitments for these action plans. In addition, 2014–2016 action plans were the first to be assessed according to the IRM’s “Did it open government?” variable, which is only assessed in IRM end-of-term reports. Action plans that lack data for any of the three indicators above receive a designation of “No IRM Data” for that indicator on the member page.

In addition to the number of achievements per action plan, the *Commitment performance* section also shows the highest number of achievements any OGP member has attained *in a single action plan* for each indicator. These comparative numbers take into account all OGP action plans and are meant to give readers an idea of where they stand compared to the “leader,” both in their region and across OGP as a whole.



How to get more starred commitments

This section illustrates the binding constraints, i.e., the main barriers, to achieving more starred commitments. Based on the IRM definition of a starred commitment, this section shows where most commitments in each action plan “fell off the path” to receiving a star. There are three main categories presented:

1. Design issues: Three of the four criteria for achieving a starred commitment deal with design: specificity, relevance, and potential impact. If a commitment does not meet one of these three criteria, it cannot be a starred commitment (even if it is fully implemented), and therefore falls into this category. The zoom-in feature on the graph allows readers to see exactly which of the three criteria was most problematic:

a. Verifiability: Includes commitments that did not meet the specificity criteria, i.e., commitments that the IRM scored as “none” or “low” specificity.

b. Relevance: Includes commitments that were verifiable, but did not meet the relevance criteria, i.e., were not clearly related to access to information, civic participation, or public accountability.

c. Ambition: Includes commitments that were both verifiable *and* relevant but did not have a “transformative” potential impact.

2. Implementation issues: This grouping includes commitments that achieved all of the three design criteria but did not meet the fourth criteria for achieving a starred commitment: implementation. In other words, this category includes “well-designed” commitments that the IRM assessed as having “none” or “limited” completion.

3. Starred commitments: This category includes commitments that satisfied all four criteria and therefore received a star.

The data for each action plan in this section adds up to 100% because this analysis assigns each non-starred commitment with a *single* reason for its non-starred status. For example, commitments that lacked verifiability, relevance, *and* ambition are *only* counted in the *Verifiability* grouping above. This is because verifiability is required to properly assess

potential impact. Therefore, verifiability is a limiting factor. Likewise, a commitment with both design and implementation issues is only counted in the design issues grouping, since a poorly designed commitment cannot be starred, regardless of how well it is implemented later. Design is therefore the limiting factor in this case. By using this methodology, this section illustrates which specific “rung of the ladder” was the binding constraint for achieving a star.

Selected dimensions of open government

Since the founding of OGP, participating governments have committed to implement different areas of open government—whether through the Open Government Declaration, the OGP Eligibility Requirements and Values Check, public endorsement of OGP’s general strategy, or the Paris Declaration. At the same time, governments (as well as civil society organizations and multilateral organizations) have lacked a way to track progress in these areas. Consequently, this data model combines IRM-based data with third-party data to enable 1) assessments for each member on performance within and outside the OGP framework, 2) comparisons of performance across OGP members, and 3) action implications for each OGP member on where they can play a leadership role, whether by implementing domestic reforms or by playing a peer support role with other members.

Importantly, the goal of this section is to serve as an informative tool that not only provides insights on how to develop more precisely targeted reforms in selected areas of open government, but also incentivizes a race to the top through comparisons. As mentioned earlier, the selected dimensions of open government are not meant to capture the rich diversity of reforms that fall under the umbrella of open government, nor are they meant to suggest that OGP requires action in any of the areas. While this section can serve as an input into policy discussions, OGP action plans are ultimately supposed to reflect local priorities. For more details on how the dimensions were chosen, see the subsection in this *Methods* section on *Selecting the dimensions of open government*. For more details on the specific indicators used in the report, see Annex B and C on data sources.

The three main components of this section are summarized below and described in more detail in the sections that follow:

- 1. IRM-based findings:** Reflect the performance of commitments in the particular policy area, as assessed by the IRM.
- 2. Third-party scores:** Reflect “real-world” performance, i.e., performance in the particular policy area outside of the OGP framework. These are composite scores comprised of various indicators collected by respected partner organizations.
- 3. Action implications:** These are recommendations on the role that each OGP member might play in each policy area. The recommendations are derived from a combination of the IRM-based findings and third-party scores.

IRM-based findings

These findings indicate the strength of a member’s OGP commitments in a specific area of open government. For each sub-dimension included in the model, OGP entities could receive up to six possible designations, based on the strength of their commitments according to the IRM. Each designation is described below:

- 1. Showed early results:** At least one commitment in the policy area significantly opened government.
- 2. Was ambitious:** At least one commitment in the policy area is ambitious.
- 3. Was complete:** At least one commitment in the policy area is complete.
- 4. IRM-Reviewed:** At least one commitment in the policy area has been assessed by the IRM, and the results were published in a final IRM report.
- 5. Commitments in this area:** There is at least one commitment in the policy area.
- 6. No commitments:** There are no commitments in the policy area.

All designations are based on IRM data. Specifically, commitments are considered ambitious if they received “moderate” or “transformative” potential impact according to the IRM *and* are relevant to access to information, civic participation, or public

accountability. Commitments are considered complete if they received a score of “substantial” or “complete” from the IRM. Commitments are considered to have significantly opened government if they received a score of “major” or “outstanding” on the IRM’s “Did it Open Government?” variable.

The model takes into account all action plans submitted by OGP members and does not treat commitments differently based on when they were made. For example, an ambitious and complete open contracting commitment from a 2012–2014 action plan and one from a 2014–2016 action plan would both result in check marks under the “Was complete” and “Was Ambitious” categories under open contracting.

Third-party scores

These scores indicate the strength of an OGP member’s performance outside of OGP in a specific area of open government. The scores are derived from third-party data sources, which are listed in Annex B and C. For more details on how the specific datasets were selected, see the section on Data Selection Process earlier in this method section.

Operationalizing the third-party indicators

The three principles that guided the process were real-world relevance of the data, actionability, and interpretability. Specifically, the goal was to create a comprehensive—yet simple-to-understand—framework that readers could use to easily identify real-world issues and solutions.

To improve interpretability, the OGP Global Report team prioritized the use of raw scores (over aggregated scores). For example, although the Tax Justice Network assigns different weights to its indicators to produce the Financial Secrecy Index, this report uses only the unweighted raw data on company ownership.

To facilitate comparisons across data sources that use different scales for scoring, all third-party indicators were adjusted to range between 0 and 4 using simple linear transformation. Importantly, the third-party data was not normalized using min-max-transformations, which would produce relative scores. Only absolute scores were used for this report to avoid giving the false impression that some countries are strong performers in a given policy area only because they



outperform their peers (e.g., beneficial ownership, in which most countries have low scores). Conversely, countries are not penalized for underperforming compared to others if they perform well in absolute terms (e.g., civic space, in which most countries have high scores).¹

Since the primary purpose of the data model was to provide actionable policy insights for each OGP member (instead of an index), scores were not standardized using Z-scores or similar measures. For example, this report features raw Varieties of Democracy (V-Dem) data that corresponds to real-world assessments (e.g., for the repression of CSOs: severe, substantial, moderate, weak, and none), rather than standardized versions of the same indicators.

The individual third-party indicators for each policy area are aggregated using simple means to produce an overall third-party score for each sub-dimension of open government. In some cases, indicators are grouped based on their topic (e.g., access to contracts, fairness of bidding procedures). In other cases, indicators are grouped based on their source (e.g., World Justice Project, Freedom House).

The only exception is in the beneficial ownership sub-dimension, which combines two indicators using a high watermark point system. For more details on this sub-dimension and on the rest of the model, see Table 2 in Annex B, which lists the specific indicators used to build all scores. Full definitions for each of the variables can be found online.²

During the development of the data model, the OGP Global Report team carried out a sensitivity analysis to ensure the high quality of the indicators used. In particular, after checking correlations, some indicators were left out of the model as they were not closely associated with the other sources.

Action implications

These are recommendations on the role that an OGP member might play in each policy area. The possible values, along with their definitions, are listed below:

1. Share innovation: These members are high performers in the respective policy area according to the third-party score, regardless of the strength of their OGP commitments (if any) in the area. As leaders, these members may consider playing a

peer-support role by sharing their experiences and innovations with others in OGP, if they are not already doing so.

2. Implement for results: These are members making OGP commitments to improve their performance in the respective policy area. Specifically, these members have low third-party scores (below 3) but have made either ambitious OGP commitments or commitments that have demonstrated early results (receiving a score of “major” or “outstanding” in the IRM report). As members that have demonstrated political commitment through OGP, the next step is ensuring that implemented commitments have maximal impact.

3. Consider action: These members have room for improvement in the respective policy area according to the third-party score and have not leveraged their OGP action plans to address the issue. Specifically, these members have a low third-party score (below 3) and have not made ambitious OGP commitments or commitments that have shown early results. They may consider reforms in the respective policy area, either within or outside of the OGP framework.

4. New initiative: Similar to the “consider action” action implication, these members have a low third-party score (below 3) and have not made ambitious OGP commitments or commitments that have shown early results. However, these members have recently made commitment(s) in the respective policy area that have not yet been assessed by the IRM. The OGP community will monitor these commitments and soon report on the progress achieved.

5. No data: There is not enough third-party data available to identify an action implication.



Annex A. About the Independent Reporting Mechanism

The Independent Reporting Mechanism (IRM) is a key means by which governments, civil society, and the private sector can track progress in OGP-participating countries. The IRM produces annual reports for each OGP member that assess the development and implementation of OGP action plans, following a public and clearly defined methodology.

Methodology

To meet its mandate, the IRM partners with researchers based in each OGP entity who carry out a combination of desk research and stakeholder interviews to write the IRM reports, which build on the findings of government self-assessments and other assessments published by third parties. Since 2016, each OGP country is assessed annually, once at the midpoint of the action plan (IRM midterm report) and once at the end of the action plan (IRM end-of-term report). In addition to assessing the development of the action plan and key indicators on the quality of commitments (specificity, relevance, potential impact, and completion), the IRM also assesses whether commitments led to changes in government behavior (the “Did it open government?” variable featured in this report).

For participants in the OGP local program, the IRM assessed the development of the action plan and the design of commitments (specificity, relevance, and potential impact) in IRM design reports, which were published shortly after the submission of action plans. Completion, the “Did it open government” variable, and the quality of consultations during the implementation of the action plan were assessed in subsequent IRM implementation reports. Beginning in 2019, the IRM will follow this reporting model for OGP countries as well. For more details on the IRM methodology, see the IRM procedures manual, which is available online at <https://www.opengovpartnership.org/irm>.

Review process

Each report undergoes a four-step review and quality-control process:

- 1. Initial review:** IRM staff and reviewers check reports for grammar, readability, content, and adherence to the IRM methodology.
- 2. International Experts Panel (IEP) review:** The IEP—a global panel of experts in transparency, participation, accountability, and social science research methods—reviews the content of the report for rigorous evidence to support findings and provides technical recommendations for improving the implementation of commitments and realization of OGP values through the action plan as a whole.
- 3. Prepublication review:** Government and select civil society organizations are invited to provide comments on the content of the draft IRM report.
- 4. Public comment period:** The public is invited to provide comments on the content of the draft IRM report. Public comments are published alongside the final report.

This review process, including the procedure for incorporating comments received, is outlined in greater detail in Section III of the IRM Procedures Manual referenced earlier.

There are two key variables used here worth explaining more:

Starred commitments: This is a composite indicator used to evaluate the design and implementation of a commitment. To receive a star, commitments must meet the following four criteria:

Verifiability or specificity: “Verifiable” (on a new two-point scale) or “Medium” or “High” on an older four-point scale.

Relevance to open government: Commitment language must clearly explain how the commitment will enhance OGP values of access to information, civic participation, and public accountability.

Potential impact: Commitments must receive a rating of “transformative.” This is based on a three-part description: 1) What is the problem? 2) What is the status quo at the beginning of the action plan? 3) How will implementation change government practice?

Early results: Did it open government?

The commitment can receive a rating of “outstanding” or “major” if it has been seen to improve open government practice in one of the three OGP values. Outstanding commitments affect entire sectors, while major ones address one specific policy area or application (e.g., extractives vs. metal mining). A designation of early results does not preclude that there may be other results later in time (or that early achievements may be reversed). It is not a substitute for rigorous impacts assessment due to issues of time and method—many commitments were implemented very recently relative to the assessment and assessing more than government practice is beyond the scope of the IRM.



Annex B. Data by Topic Area

IRM-based data

An OGP commitment is considered relevant to a particular policy area depending on how it is tagged by OGP staff in the publicly available OGP Commitment Database.³ OGP staff use publicly available definitions of key policy areas to code each commitment based on its policy focus(es).

Governments were able to review their member page data before the launch of this report to point out inconsistencies and identify any errors in coding. Table 1 below lists which tags in the OGP Commitment Database were used to group commitments into each policy area, along with definitions.

Annex C. Third-Party Data by Source

Selected Dimensions of Open Government

This section lists all of the third-party databases used to build the Selected Dimensions of Open Government section that is featured in the member pages and referenced throughout this report. Each mini-section includes information on the lead organization, method, coverage, relevant topics, and where it appears in the report. For more details about the specific indicators featured in the report, see Annex B. Data by Topic Area.

1. Freedom in the World: The flagship annual report produced by Freedom House assesses the condition of political rights and civil liberties since 1973.

a. Method: Expert analysts make the assessments, which are reviewed by expert advisers, regional specialists, and Freedom House staff.

b. Coverage: The 2018 edition covers 195 countries and 14 territories, including all 99 OGP members.

c. Relevant topics: Includes assessments of various aspects of civic space, such as freedom of assembly, expression, and media.

d. Featured in: Freedom of assembly, freedom of association, and defending journalists and activists sub-dimensions in the member pages. Also featured in each of the three civic space sections in the Priority Areas for Reform part of the report.

2. Financial Secrecy Index: The Tax Justice Network produces this index to assess global financial secrecy and the scale of offshore financial activities.

a. Method: Researchers around the globe carry out desk research to review reports, legislation, regulations, and news, which complements the information from questionnaires sent to governments.

b. Coverage: The 2018 edition covers 112 jurisdictions, 49 of which are OGP members.

c. Relevant topics: Includes assessments of beneficial ownership transparency, including whether legal and/or beneficial ownership information is recorded and/or published online.

d. Featured in: Beneficial ownership sub-dimension in the member pages, as well as the beneficial ownership section in the Priority Areas for Reform part of the report.

3. Open Budget Survey: The International Budget Partnership (IBP) produces the world's only independent and comparative measure of central government budget transparency.

a. Method: Local researchers complete a questionnaire that includes 145 questions, which is then reviewed by IBP staff, peer reviewers, and governments.

b. Coverage: The 2017 edition covered 115 countries, 61 of which are OGP countries.

c. Relevant topics: Includes assessments of public availability of budget information, public engagement during the budget process, and oversight capacity of independent fiscal institutions.

d. Featured in: All three sub-dimensions of the Fiscal Openness dimension in the member pages.

4. Open Data Barometer: The World Web Foundation publishes this open data index, which measures how governments are publishing and using open data for accountability, innovation, and social impact.

a. Method: The dataset sub-index used in this report is produced through peer-reviewed expert surveys that require checking primary sources.

b. Coverage: The 2017 edition covered 115

countries and jurisdictions. The 2018 edition covered 30 countries. Altogether, the two editions covered 65 OGP countries. Note that this report uses the most recent data available for each OGP country. For consistency, the 2017 scores were adjusted to match changes in the method in the 2018 edition.

c. Relevant topics: Includes assessments of open data regarding company registers and public contracts.

d. Featured in: Open contracting and beneficial ownership sub-dimensions in the member pages, as well as the open contracting and beneficial ownership sections in the Priority Areas for Reform part of the report.

5. Open Data Inventory: This inventory published by Open Data Watch assesses the coverage and openness of official statistics published on the official website of national statistics offices (NSOs).

a. Method: Researchers directly review the website of the NSOs to assess the datasets, followed by two layers of review.

b. Coverage: The 2018 edition covered 178 countries, including all 79 OGP member countries.

c. Relevant topics: Includes assessments of the coverage and openness of datasets related to public services.

d. Featured in: Water and sanitation, health, and education sub-dimensions in the member pages, as well as the Priority Areas for Reform sections on the same topics.

6. Global Right to Information Rating: The Centre for Law and Democracy (CLD) and Access Info Europe (AIE) produce this tool that measures the strength of legal frameworks for the right to access information held by public authorities.

a. Method: CLD and AIE researchers produce assessments of legal frameworks, which are then reviewed by local experts.

b. Coverage: The 2018 edition covers 123 countries, of which 73 are OGP countries.

c. Relevant topics: Includes assessments of right to information legislation.

d. Featured in: Right to information sub-dimension in the member pages.

7. Rule of Law Index: The World Justice Project produces this annual index, which measures how the rule of law is experienced and perceived by the general public.

a. Method: A combination of household and expert surveys are used to calculate scores.

b. Coverage: The 2018 edition covers 113 countries, of which 65 are OGP countries.

c. Relevant topics: Includes assessments of right to information in practice, fundamental civil rights, and fairness in procurement.

d. Featured in: Open contracting, freedom of assembly, freedom of association, defending journalists and activists, participation in lawmaking, and right to information sub-dimensions in the member pages, as well as the sections on open contracting, freedom of association, freedom of assembly, and defending journalists and activists in the Priority Areas for Reform part of the report.

2. Varieties of Democracy (V-Dem): The V-Dem Institute produces one of the largest-ever social science databases, which contains over 19 million data points on different principles of democracy.

a. Method: About half of the indicators are based on factual information from official documents, the other half is coded by experts, typically five per indicator.

b. Coverage: The 2018 edition covers the years 1789–2017 and 201 countries, of which 78 are OGP countries.

c. Relevant topics: Includes assessments of the operating environment for civil society organizations, quality of government consultations, participation by women, and harassment of journalists.

d. Featured in: Freedom of association, defending journalists and activists, and participation in lawmaking sub-dimensions in the member pages, as well as the sections on freedom of association and defending



journalists and activists in the Priority Areas for Reform part of the report.

2. World Bank Global Indicators of Regulatory

Governance: The World Bank presents new measures of transparency, civic participation, and government accountability across the life cycle of regulations.

Method: Regulatory experts around the world complete questionnaires, which complement questionnaires completed by regulatory government agencies.

Coverage: The 2018 edition covers 186 countries, including all 79 OGP countries.

Relevant topics: Includes assessments of regulatory transparency, consultations on proposed regulations (as well as report-backs on the consultations), and the public accessibility of laws.

Featured in: Open rules and regulations sub-dimension in the member pages.

Other datasets in the Priority Areas for Reform section

1. GLAAS Database: The UN-Water Global Analysis and Assessment of Sanitation and Drinking-Water (GLAAS) is the largest global dataset on water, sanitation, and hygiene governance.

a. Method: The data is based on self-reported data from governments, which is verified by World Health Organization Staff.

b. Coverage: Covers 79 countries, 32 of which are OGP countries.

c. Topics of relevance to OGP: The 2018 dataset covers finance (including to women and poor and marginalized communities), public participation, access to planning documentation, and basic governance structures.

d. Featured in: Despite the high quality of the database, it is only represented in the section on Water and Sanitation because it covers only 32 OGP countries.

2. OGP Eligibility Criteria

a. Method: Mixed, but primarily primary source review and legal analysis. See <https://www.opengovpartnership.org/resources/eligibility-criteria> for more details.

b. Coverage: Most data covers most OGP countries. Where there are gaps, producing organizations have carried out special assessments.

c. Topics and sub-indicators:

i. Fiscal openness (International Budget Partnership)

ii. Public Officials' Asset Disclosure Database (World Bank)

iii. Right to information law (Centre for Law and Democracy, Access Info Europe; Open Society Justice Initiative)

iv. Civil liberties score (Economist Intelligence Unit)

d. Featured in: Collective Results section on early results of OGP.

3. International Budget Partnership - Program Based Budgets in Health

a. Method: The data is based on self-reported data from governments, which is verified by World Health Organization Staff.

b. Coverage: Covers 79 countries, 32 of which are OGP countries.

c. Topics of relevance to OGP: The 2018 dataset covers finance (including to women and poor and marginalized communities), public participation, access to planning documentation, and basic governance structures.

d. Featured in: Despite the high quality of the database, it is only represented in the section on Health because it covers only 20 OGP countries.

4. CIVICUS Monitor: CIVICUS produces this tool that aims to share reliable, up-to-date data on the state of civil society freedoms in all countries.

a. Method: The Monitor relies on civil society reports, international indices, country-specific CIVICUS reports, periodic research and interviews, and input from local civil society, reviewed by an independent panel of experts.

b. Coverage: The Monitor covers 196 countries, including all 79 OGP countries.

c. Topics of relevance to OGP: The data includes assessments of freedoms of association, peaceful assembly, and expression.

d. Featured in: Freedom of association, freedom of assembly, and defending journalists and activists sections in the Priority Areas for Reform part of the report.
