

## Statement of H.E. Nasser Shraideh, Minister of Planning and International Cooperation of the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan

The Open Government Partnership (OGP) has grown tremendously since it was founded over 10 years ago, and I am extremely proud that Jordan is still at the forefront of this commitment to dialogue and change. When we joined this collaborative initiative in 2011 it comprised of 8 founding members, and today it is a global network consisting of 78 countries and 76 local communities working together to achieve measurable improvements in government openness

Since 2011 Jordan has successfully implemented four successful National Action Plans (NAPs), and we have come a long way in our journey towards engaging civil society and the public in national dialogues around key legislation. Moving forward we are hoping to surpass our "involve" level targets and make even further progress.
